|      | Welcome and Opening Remarks In his welcome remarks, the Permanent secretary Borno state Ministry of Agriculture Alhaji Zannah Garga encouraged partners not to relent in the efforts they were making to ensure that food and adequate provision reached the people who have been affected by the insurgency. He noted with dismay that the Borno state Government has been getting reports and allegations that some humanitarian actors were engaging in other activities other than providing humanitarian assistance. Some of the allegations include spending donor funds on non-humanitarian and unrelated activities rather than using the funds for the welfare of the people.  He appealed to all the partners in the Food Sector to continue to unite in their activities to and by so doing continue to convince the international community that many vulnerable people are being reached with humanitarian assistance.  He informed the meeting that due to the absence of the state commissioner of Agriculture who was on an official trip, he had to travel to inspect some ongoing projects and thereafter excused himself from the meeting. |                     |                  |          |
