1.	Response gap analysis	Next Steps / Action Points
1.	7.1 million people will be in need of Food assistance in South Sudan at the peak of the lean season 2024 as per the October 2023 IPC. As per FSLC CO1, 3.5 M beneficiaries are targeted to receive food assistance and out of this, 745,519 beneficiaries have received Food assistance through WFP and partners as of February 2024. This registers a huge gap on People in need of support. See the Response dashboard <a href="here">here</a> for more information.	Partners are encouraged to fundraise/ mobilize for resources to mitigate the gaps, especially in Aweil East and other IPC4 counties with the largest response gaps as per the gap analysis here
2.	Likewise, huge gaps have been registered in agriculture support although there has been distribution of fishing kits and seeds. 100% of agriculture support has been in-kind since the beginning of 2024.	
3.	FSLC encourages CASH Based assistance support as part of our strategy to encourage the localisation agenda.

4.		Update on the SSHF Standard Allocation	Next Steps / Action Points
	1.	OCHA launched an SSHF Standard Allocation of 20M USD.	FSL Cluster will share guidelines
	2.	Donors have provided strict guidelines which were used and still been used in prioritizing counties through Ranking prioritization which among other information used information from the field , NAAWG Assessments, etc	to partners once OCHA is clear on the way forward on SSHF approach.
	3.	4 counties have been pre-selected as priority areas (Aweil East, Pibor, Rubkona and Nasir), although discussions are still ongoing with OCHA.	•
	4.	OCHA emphasized that Localization will be an important factor in approvals of SSHF funds this year and the FSLC will continue advocating so that 25 % of the funding is allocated to national NGOs.	
	5.	FSLC is proposing 2 approaches, a Multi Sectoral Response and a stand-alone approach purely for Livelihood support. There is already a strategy that has been developed between FSL, Health, Nutrition, WASH and Protection clusters to work together through a common approach using 3 entry points at Household, Community and Facility levels. This is still a work in progress, and it is still not clear how OCHA will approach and implement this proposed integrated strategy.
