Agenda 1: Gu Floods Response Preparedness

Average to slightly above average rainfall amounts expected over most of Somalia during this Gu Season. However, the rain may be concentrated during the start of the Gu Season in early April. Flooding may occur along riverine areas due to open riverbanks (breakages). The forecasted floods will unlikely be of the same magnitude of what was witnessed during the last

Deyr season; however, precautions need to be in place to minimize damage and ensure safety of affected communities. This might present several risks to the communities being flooded, destruction of agricultural, land increases in human and animal diseases, spreading of pests and reduced access to markets and services as roads are flooded.

Gu rainy season has high likelihood of above average rainfall and subsequent flooding because of El Niño, Flooding expected to impact 770K across all of Somalia.

Similarly, Jubaland districts anticipated to be affected by both flash and riverine flooding. Baardheere has been selected as a prioritized district for Gu flooding response by the 2024 HNRP.

Baardheere is in Extreme (Category 4) Inter-cluster Severity index, as calculated in the 2024 HNRP. Rainfall has already started in Gedo region, making flooding an immediate concern in the coming weeks.

Boat prepositioning will be critical especially for the riverine areas. This could be liaised with logistic cluster.

Jubaland Partners to share their planned response for the GU floods.

There is need to have Evacuation guidelines prior through SWALIM and this is very important and same messages to be disseminated widely among for earlier preparation.

Early warning messages need to be disseminated widely and should have a better effect on partners for better preparedness.

Drainage of canals and rehabilitation of flood defense structures and prepartaion of Flood protection sandbags was recommended .

It was emphasised that stocks should be in place and prepositioned in the required areas susceptible/prone to floodings.

SWALIM's engagement was recommended to stay updated on flood preparedness and evacuation plans during flood emergencies.

The Logistics Cluster has established a humanitarian logistics hub in Baidoa for temporary cargo storage, facilitating onward air transport to other locations.

The helicopter stationed in Mogadishu but can be deployed to other key hubs, including Jubaland districts, based on needs.

Early warning dissemination.

Ensure the provision of life-saving information, awareness raising and early warning through coordinated, simple, and understandable language disseminated through communication means that are preferred by the community.

To ensure that early warning information is reached to diverse dissects of the population, multiple communication channels need to be used included.

Face to face community outreach: partners on the ground will have to conduct face to face. community meetings, awareness sessions, door to door visits and individual communications.

Radio Broadcasting: radio stations that have partnership with humanitarian actors will have broadcast radio programs in local languages based on the key message earlier warning on flood.

Loud-speaker announcements: using the loudspeaker on mobile vehicles as well as static places (like in Mosques or main market etc.) the audio contents will be played.

Through Community Leaders: through the humanitarian partner on the ground the key messages will be delivered to the community leaders who then will disseminate among the community people.

Through Religious leaders: through the humanitarian partner on the ground the key messages will be delivered to religious leaders who then will disseminate the messages and include in the lectures during prayers (like-Friday prayers where large number of people are gathered).

Bulk SMS: sending out short push messages, will use the mechanism to disseminate early warning and key awareness information to the communities.

Action point : Jubaland Partners to share their planned response for the GU floods.

Agenda 2: Lessons learnt from the Previous Flood.

El Niño storms triggered historic rainfall during the Deyr 2023 season in southern Somalia, causing riverine flooding along the Juba and Shabelle rivers. El Nino heavy rains experienced across Jubaland state in various districts that effected lives and livelihood as well as disrupted food supply chain and destructed crucial agricultural infrastructures for farming including irrigation water pumps, canals shallow well and irrigation pipes particularly in Gedo region.

Flooding affected 2.5 million and displaced 1.7 million across the country, including hundreds of thousands in Jubaland.

Lessons learnt from previous El Nino Deyr 2023.

- ❖ In terms of timely evacuation some people never moved because of lack of support, others reported that they have chosen not to move since basic services like latrines were not available in the field.
- ❖ Early warning messages need to have better effect in comparison to previous flooding and partners should be in a position for better preparedness.
- ❖ There was hardly enough preparedness for El Nino by the partners even though SWALIM of FAO shared continuous rain situation projection/outlook including several Early warnings to protect lives and save livelihood prior.
- ❖ The coordination efforts were minimal during flood response especially between Jubaland FSC and partners implementing SHF projects as well as food donations from Gulf countries to avoid duplication and overlap.
- ❖ Early warning messages dissemination was not adequately engaged religious leaders that adversely affected the desired impact especially Bardhere district.
- Some identified and selected safe point evacuation centres also affected by flooding, there is need to conduct thorough selection process to avoid such risk.
- There was not enough food and other essentials item prepositioning despite having prior of the flood occurrence.
- Only few partners managed to share flood response anticipatory plan with the cluster, therefore there is high need to coordinate and collaborate with food security cluster during this Gu flooding session.
- ❖ The food prepositioned was not enough to sustain during flooding period.
- ❖ Timely flood response was minimal during flooding, therefore partners ought to have strategic preparedness for the Gu flood.

Agenda 3: Area Based Coordination and Integrated Response.

The Area Based Coordination (**ABC**) is an operational coordination platform established to support more effective and efficient operational coordination of humanitarian responses in a designated district.

Area Based Coordination (**ABC**) was recommended by HCT and led by OCHA, primarily deals with integrated response based on prioritization of inter-sectoral severity 4 and 5.

In the 2024 Humanitarian Needs and Response Plan (**HNRP**), the HCT **identified 10 priority districts** for integrated humanitarian response, to be reviewed on a quarterly basis. The HCT decided to activate Area Based Coordination (ABCs) in those districts. More ABC's can be set up in case of future shocks or localized coordination needs.

HNRP required rapid response in priority districts:

Districts most affected by floods (**Belet Weyne, Luuq, Baidoa, Bardhere, Afmadow, Kismayo, Jamame, Banadir**): access to water, sanitation, and health to mitigate cholera/AWD outbreaks; access to food; emergency livelihood support and rehabilitation of destroyed critical infrastructure as it was indicated population group of highest humanitarian concern mainly caused by Deyr flooding 2023.
