

FSL Cluster GBV prevention plan for 2018



Key Steps:

1. Baseline Survey

Measure the existing GBV capacity and/or needs within the South Sudan FSLC

2. GBV prevention risk analysis

Identify areas of priority action to be taken by the FSLC to prevent GBV risks arising out of humanitarian food & livelihood/ livestock assistance

3. GBV prevention Action Plan

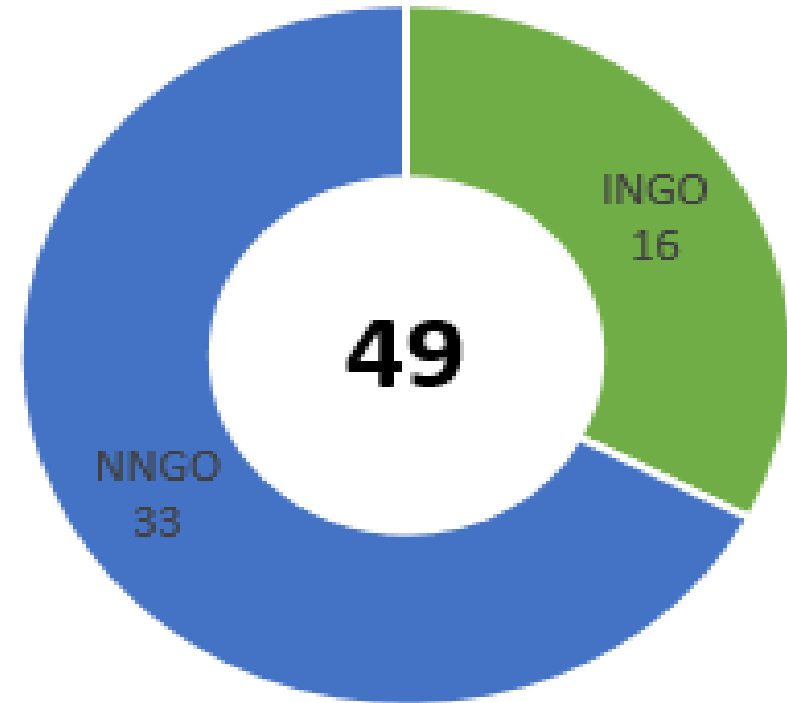
Awareness raising, complementary training sessions on – GBV and PSEA awareness; Referral pathways for non-specialists; and mainstreaming GBV prevention etc.

1. Baseline Survey - Review



Question	Review comments
Q1: Partner technical capacity	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Technical capacity is generally low• Cluster members can tap into the partners who attended the ECHO (8) and UNICEF (2) training
Q2: GBV action plan or strategy for prevention / mainstreaming of GBV	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Contact partners with corporate/national strategy• FSL cluster to support partners with a simple strategy template
Q3: Monitoring tools	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Need for a user friendly monitoring tool that can be adopted by ALL partners• Option to tap into gFSC/ GBV/ Protection expert to sift through what partners have available and provide a simple agreed upon tool for common usage;• Ensure contextualization for South Sudan
Q4: GBV training capacity of staff	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• We need to support GBV prevention training for staff who have not received; especially focus on the weaker NNGOs through mentorship & resources;• Emphasis on taking this training beyond the organization to having a broader community focus for measurable effect, outcome, impact

1. Baseline Survey – Review (cont...)



Question	Review comments
Q5: PSEA action plan or strategy in organizations	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• There is need for a model sample action plan that partners can use as a management tool: plan -> action -> review & learn;• Inclusion of staff code of conduct and complaints & disciplinary procedures – be clear on the basic minimum for inclusion
Q6: Lesson learnt/Practices that can be shared	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Consult with partners with documented lessons learnt/practices• Tap into FSL partners already trained at FSL meetings and in any planned training
Q7: Need for GBV capacity support	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• 100% request. By whom and on what?• Mentorship, on-the-job training, workshops, tools and more non-women focused protection
Q8: In-house GBV capacity among partners	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Majority of respondents are without capacity• Some partners with capacity and ready to share.
Q9: Mainstreaming GBV in current programmes	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Further promotion beyond the organization for effect in programming;• Challenge the high achievers to be more ambitious

2. GBV prevention risk analysis



Context of South Sudan and high prevalence of GBV/ PSEA;

Some key factors:

- Governance & political crisis in a fragile state leading to lack of rule of law
- Chronic poverty underlying protracted humanitarian crises (food security, protection, public health etc.)
- Inherent cultural inequalities in gender power relations between men and women
- Armed conflict heightens women and livestock as a trophy of war (being seen as commodities to possess)
- Issues raised in the humanitarian response particularly around food assistance and military/ peace keeping initiatives;

3. GBV prevention Action Plan



4 Main actions points identified as:-

1. In line with the national priority focus – Protection against Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA);
 - Need for tools and action plan to ensure we ‘do no harm’
 - Development of a PSEA pocket book
 - Rapid assessment tool with a GBV/PSEA mind-set/lens
 - Support recruitment of female staff
2. Promotion of GBV prevention mainstreaming
 - Adoption of standard tools & checklists to support intentional GBV mainstreaming
 - Building capacity of partners to eliminate harm and measure mainstreaming
3. Partners to share good practice & lessons learnt:
 - Use our FSL partners with experience and capacity to support others
 - FSL partners provide guest contributions on a monthly basis at the FSL meetings in 2018/2019
4. Resourcing:
 - Tapping into available capacity within FSL partners
 - GBV sub cluster under new leadership at UNFPA
 - FSLC budget and / or Global protection cluster/ GBV expertise
