Some partners are busy coming up with mitigation measures to minimize or control the PDAD issues related to humanitarian assistance hence the people in need (PIN) increased 		
<p>Banadir brief Humanitarian overview update (13 March 2024)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The FSC Coordinator presented Banadir's humanitarian Situation Overview, humanitarian response and service mapping, and Constraints, Concerns, and recommendations • Presented the top priority needs which are food (33%), shelter (31%), livelihood (20%), health (14%), and water (2%). • Recorded 7,938 new arrivals from the start of 2024, and similar needs identified by PRMN reports • About 80% of IDPs are women & children. <p>Eviction update (sites affected and conditions)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The FSC coordinator presented the recent evictions which took place in Deynile and Kaxda IDP sites to the Partners Based on the data from the Eviction monitoring team led by NRC, a total of 8,214 individuals were Evicted in Banadir in January and February 2024. The eviction report indicated that most of the victims moved to; Weydow, Siinka dheer, Durdur 2, Bacaadweyn, Xiriiriye, Aaran, Yaa allah, Buulo Barako, Buuxaaw, Gurdaale, Gaaldheere, Al-khalifa, Ilbir, Wajaale, Iidko and Waaheen all in Banadir. No humanitarian response was reported, and immediate needs observed include shelter/NFIs, food, and protection for vulnerable women and children. The FSC Coordinator urged the partners to respond to the immediate needs observed. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The FSC advocate more in the coordination forums for immediate response to the affected victims Partners assess the conditions of the evicted households and report to the FSC for more advocacy and resource mobilization. 	

<p>Humanitarian Gaps, needs, and challenges</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Banadir hosts the largest internally displaced persons (IDP) caseload in the country. • Most of these displaced individuals are in dire need of humanitarian assistance across various critical areas • Low response is reported due to funding cuts despite the growing needs in the region • PADAD is an issue affecting the humanitarian response in Banadir. Partners are still looking for strategies and measures to minimize and control post-aid diversion (PADD) reported, hence this, in turn, causes the needs to grow up. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The FSC to advocate to raise funds for immediate response • The FSC has to play a crucial role in advocating for resource mobilization during ICCG meetings and other coordination forums • Their efforts should contribute to securing the necessary resources for the effective implementation of initiatives and projects. • By actively engaging in discussions, presenting compelling cases, and collaborating with stakeholders. • FSC coordinators help ensure that essential resources are allocated to support vulnerable populations. • Partners to report any challenges facing and needs on ground on time.
