Eviction update (sites affected and conditions)	<ul> <li>The FSC coordinator presented the recent evictions which took place in Deynile and Kaxda IDP sites to the Partners</li> <li>Based on the data from the Eviction monitoring team led by NRC, a total of 8,214 individuals were Evicted in Banadir in January and February 2024.</li> <li>The eviction report indicated that most of the victims moved to; Weydow, Siinka dheer, Durdur 2, Bacaadweyn, Xiriiriye, Aaran, Yaa allah, Buulo Barako, Buuxaaw, Gurdaale, Gaaldheere, Alkhalifa, Ilbir, Wajaale, Iidko and Waaheen all in Banadir.</li> <li>No humanitarian response was reported, and immediate needs observed include shelter/NFIs, food, and protection for vulnerable women and children.</li> <li>The FSC Coordinator urged the partners to respond to the immediate needs observed.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>The FSC advocate more in the coordination forums for immediate response to the affected victims</li> <li>Partners assess the conditions of the evicted households and report to the FSC for more advocacy and resource mobilization.</li> </ul>
