# Action points

## 1. Reported Mosul Response activities in April

For the period 1-29 April, four Food Security Cluster (FSC) partners reported a total of 49,942 beneficiaries (9,899 households) received Ready to Eat Rations (RTER) / Immediate Response Rations (IRRs) at 13 west Mosul neighbourhoods. An additional 14,685 individuals (2,937 households) received dry food rations or Family Food Rations (FFRs) at 9 west Mosul, and 1 east Mosul neighbourhoods.

At 21 camps, nine FSC partners reported a total of 294,273 beneficiaries (56,985 households) received RTERs/IRRs and 207,830 beneficiaries (41,566 households) received dry food rations/FFRs, and 19,503 beneficiaries (4,706 households) received cooked meals.

At a total of 12 screening sites, host communities and villages, five FSC partners reported distributing RTERs/IRRs to 66,117 beneficiaries (13,118 households) and dry food rations/FFRs to 3,760 beneficiaries (752 households).

For the reporting period between 1-10 April, a total of 31,355 individuals (7,190 households) received PDS rations at 7 west Mosul neighbourhoods.

With an increase in displacement heading north/north-west of west Mosul, a new mustering site has been set up in Badoush, where, as of 27 April, WFP and Rapid Response Mechanism (RRM) partners have initiated some distributions of RTERs/IRRs.

Partners reported lack of functioning markets and severe access constraints in west Mosul, with some activities suspended due to security concerns.

Meanwhile in east Mosul, the only viable market is located at Walid Hajar. A number of partners are implementing multi-purpose cash programming in east Mosul, including the provision of food assistance via cash and/or vouchers.

There have been reports from west of Mosul, of the need for immediate livestock assistance in two locations - south of the Tel Afar-Tal Jarabea area, and between Tel Afar and west Mosul) for an estimated 5,000+ individuals and their respective 15,000+ livestock. Assistance needed includes fodder/animal feed, and vaccines to prevent the loss of productive assets for internally displaced persons (IDPs).

### Action points

- FSC to share with partners latest figures on food assistance and livelihoods activities reported for the month of April.
- FSC to share with partners Mosul cash and markets assessments when available.
- Partners to continue sharing information about completed and planned distributions in Mosul via the FSC weekly Mosul Response Matrix due every Sunday by 10:00am.

## 2. Situation update and stocks pre-positioning

An estimated 320,000 people have reportedly left west Mosul and relocated to camps, villages, host communities and other informal settlements. Approximately 150,000 are currently living in newly liberated areas in southern neighbourhoods of west Mosul, and 450,000 are believed to remain in IS-held areas in northern areas of west Mosul.

An increase in food needs along the Badoush displacement route were reported by partners, with continued displacements expected in the coming weeks. WFP and RRM partners have initiated providing food assistance to vulnerable families fleeing Mosul and heading towards the Badoush area.

WFP and partners are also looking into the feasibility of pre-positioning Ready-to-Eat Rations (RTERs) / Immediate Response Rations (IRRs) and dry food rations or FFRs in case river access is unavailable, due to rising water levels caused by expected heavy rains.

Distributions are also expected to commence in new liberated areas in west Mosul. These are Al-Thawra Apartments, Al-Nasr, Al-Seiha and Al-Thaniya neighborhoods.

Partners were informed that the Logistics Cluster has common storage services available for the pre-positioning of stocks on behalf of the humanitarian community at the following locations: Khazer (640 m<sup>2</sup>), Zummar (480 m<sup>2</sup>), Jad'ah (320 m<sup>2</sup>), Qayyarah Airstrip (1,280 m<sup>2</sup>), Hamam al 'Alil UNHCR (2,080 m<sup>2</sup>) and Hamam al 'Alil MoDM (1,080 m<sup>2</sup>), Debaga (480 m<sup>2</sup>) and Hajj Ali (640 m<sup>2</sup>).

Partners were encouraged to share information on their current stock capacity and pipeline for the purpose of producing a new stock matrix, and better inform response plans and gap analysis.

## 3. Camp Coordination and Management (CCCM) Updates

As of 27 April, CCCM reports indicate there are 6 active camps, 3 under construction and 1 recently completed at 10 priority locations, for a total of 21,858 plots occupied; 3,765 available and 30,211 being planned. At other locations there are 10 active camps, with 30,318 occupied plots; 4,050 available plots, and 3,874 planned plots.

The list of priority locations is expected to change, depending on access. Every camp is receiving cycles of 3 day and 30-day rations. Updated information on new camps is circulated by the CCCM Cluster.
