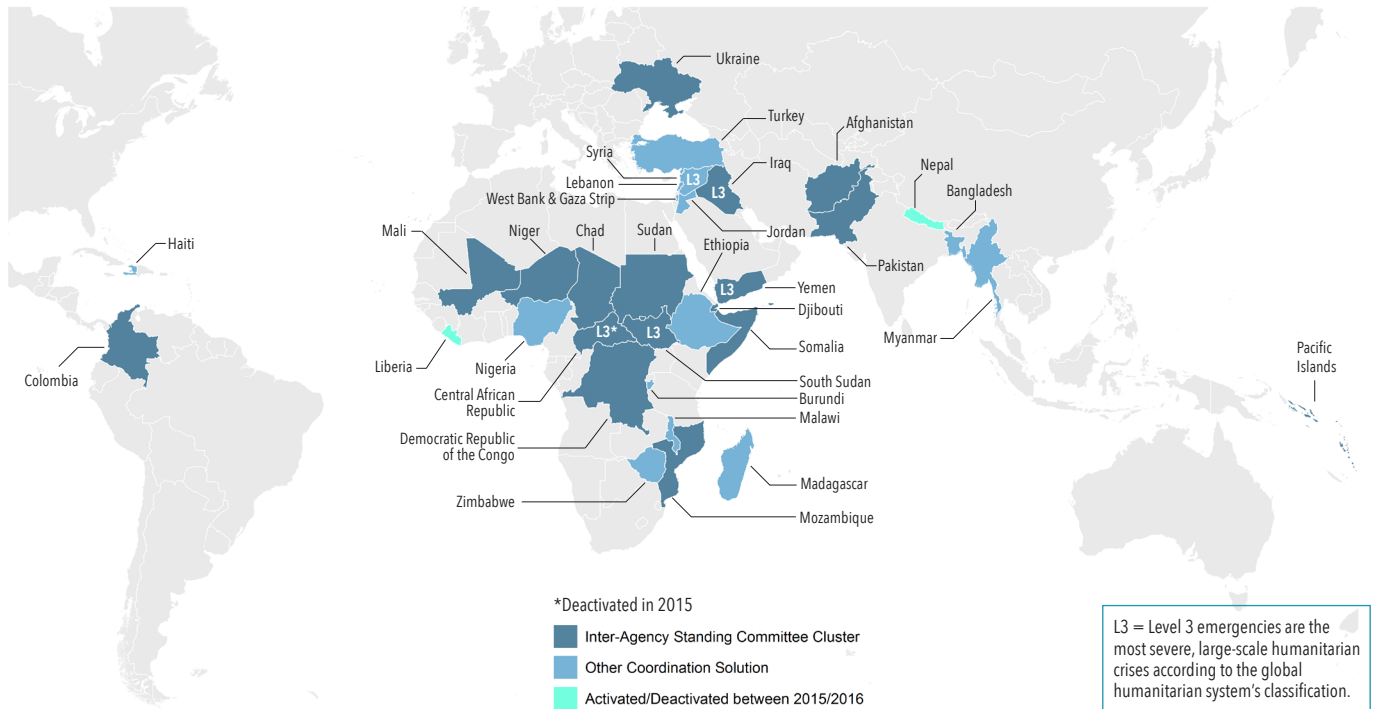


## GLOBAL FOOD SECURITY CLUSTER

### A snapshot of 2015-2016 results

To save lives and livelihoods and to ensure the dignity of people affected by humanitarian crises, Food Security Clusters coordinate the food security response in emergencies.

#### Country Food Security Clusters and Coordination Solutions in 2015 and 2016



#### THE CHALLENGE

In 2016, over **78 million** people in **emergency situations** were food insecure. This corresponds to almost the size of the population of Germany. Only **3 out of 5 people** in need received food security support with current funding levels.



#### THE APPROACH

**Country-level Food Security Clusters/Sectors** are established to coordinate food security response during a humanitarian crisis with the objective to reach as many people as possible with the current level of funding. The Food Security Clusters ensure that FAO and WFP, other UN agencies and international organizations, NGOs, civil society, donors and government representatives work hand in hand in order to reach the people in need.



**How does the Global Support Team ensure that the maximum number of people in need is reached?**

The global Food Security Cluster (gFSC) supports country Food Security Clusters. Currently, 44 countries have active Food Security Clusters or related coordination structures in place. These Food Security Clusters bring together more than 3,000 partners to coordinate their activities. The aim is to reach the maximum number of people in the shortest time frame between shock and response. The better partners work together, the more lives and livelihoods are saved!

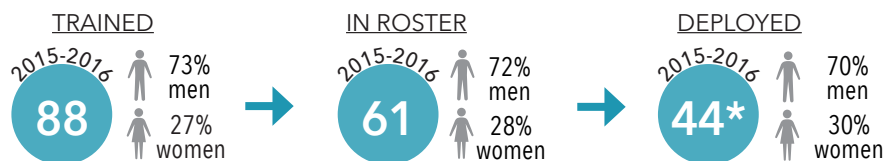
## RESULT ONE: NATIONAL CLUSTERS' CAPACITY

Strengthened response capacity in over 40 countries, including all L3\* emergencies, to coordinate over 3,000 partners worldwide and to reach over 45 million beneficiaries yearly in 2015-2016.

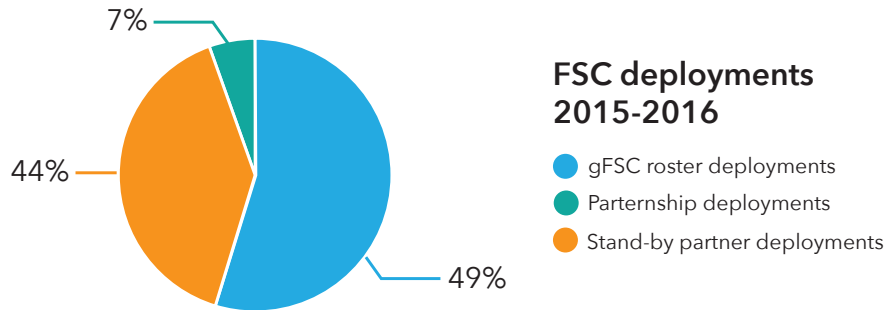

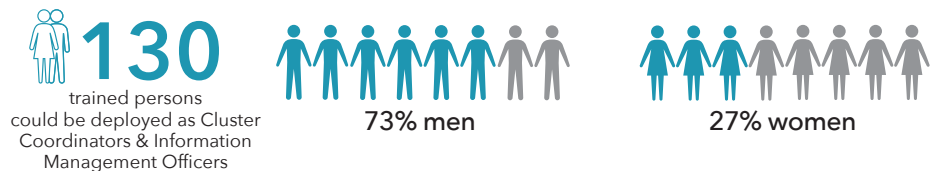
## RESULT THREE: OPERATION AND SURGE SUPPORT

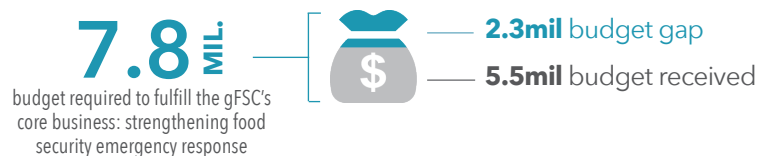

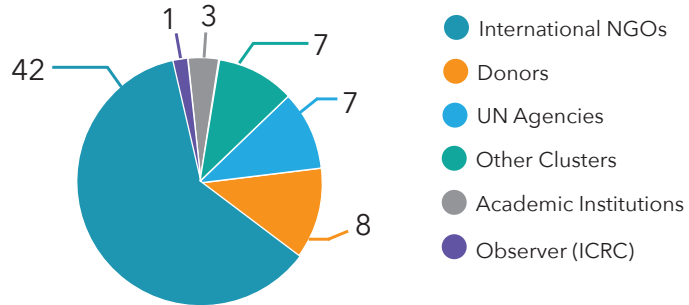


## RESULT FIVE: PARTNERSHIPS

The global Food Security Cluster has established partnerships with 68 organizations at global level. It serves as a knowledge and resource platform for over 3,000 partners in countries with active Food Security Clusters/Sectors.

DIVERSIFIED PARTNERSHIP

- Integrated Food Security Phase Classification (IPC) Global Support Unit and Global Food Security Cluster published a joint 'Guidance on Global Standards for Collaboration at Country Level'
- Collaboration with other clusters, in particular with the Nutrition Cluster, has been fostered
- Further partnerships with GenCap, CashCap and non-traditional partners, such as academic institutions, have been formed and continued

## RESULT SIX: LEARNING AND KNOWLEDGE MANAGEMENT

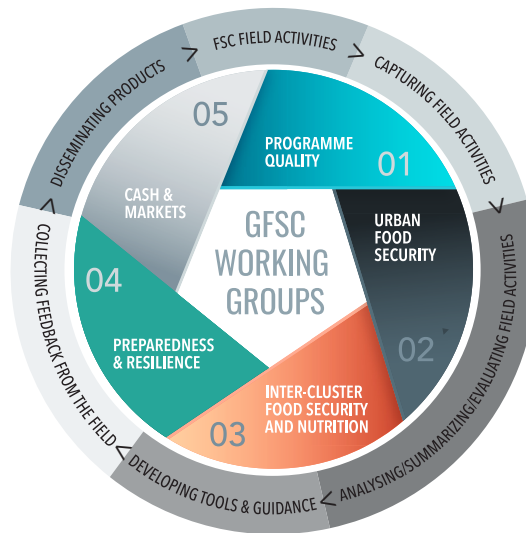
