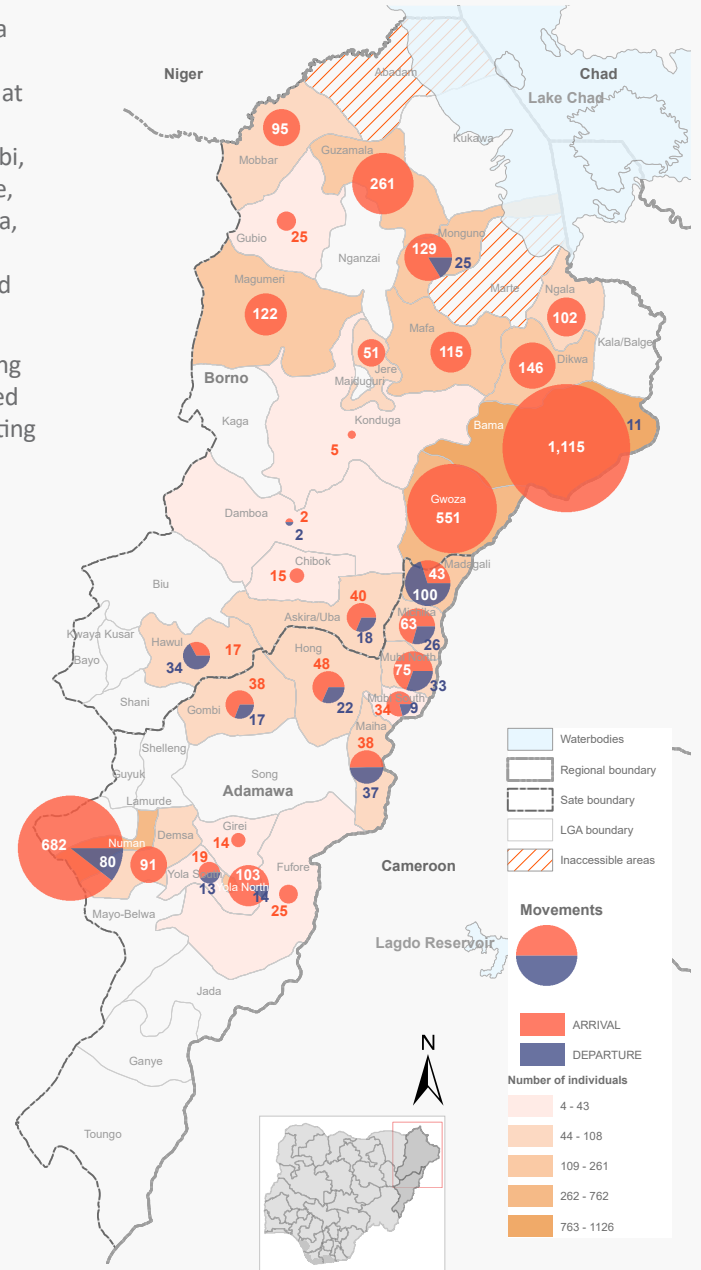
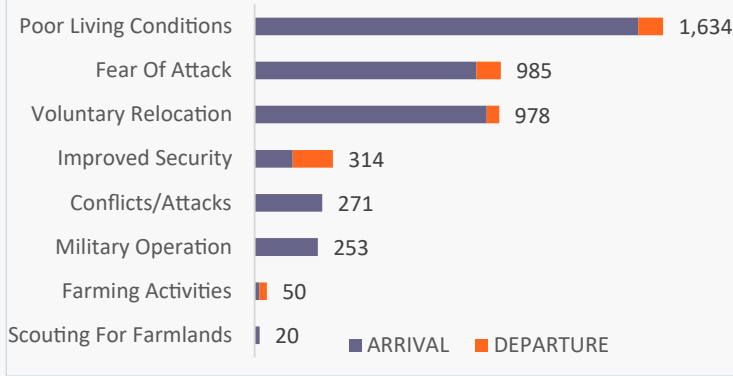
**Movements**



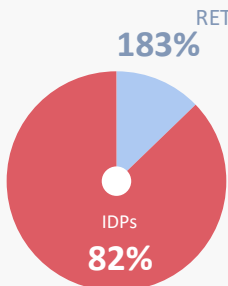
Within the period of 26 June – 2 July 2018, a total of 4,505 movements were recorded, including 4,064 arrivals and 441 departures at locations in Askira/Uba, Bama, Chibok, Damboa, Demsa, Dikwa, Fufore, Girei, Gombi, Gubio, Guzamala, Gwoza, Hawul, Hong, Jere, Konduga, Madagali, Mafa, Magumeri, Maiha, Michika, Mobbar, Monguno, Mubi-North, Mubi-South, Ngala, Numan, Yola-North and Yola-South Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Adamawa and Borno States.

Assessments identified the following main triggers of movements: poor living conditions (36%), fear of attacks (22%), voluntary relocation (22%), improved security (7%), ongoing conflict (6%), military operations (6%) and IDPs scouting for farmlands/farming activities (1%).

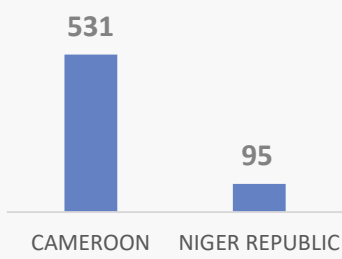
**Number of individuals by movement triggers**

**Summary of major movements**

**Yobe Update:** Following the recent closure of Pompomari Primary School Camp in Damaturu, Yobe State, over 4,025 IDPs (263 households) who were residents of the Camp have been affected and are currently in need of shelter. The situation has created a considerable influx of IDPs into Katarko and Buni Yadi areas of Gujiba LGA, where the IDPs are constructing makeshift shelters on an open ground close to the host community. The IDPs cited fear of insecurity at their various locations of origin as the major factor preventing them from returning. While DTM assessments are still ongoing in the location, urgent needs assessed so far include shelter and WASH.

**Bama:** 1,115 arrivals and 11 departures were recorded in Bama LGA of Borno State. These include 796 arrivals at GSSSS Camp from Soye/Abbaram wards of Bama, 319 arrivals at Banki Camp from Buduwa/Kumshe wards of Bama, and 11 individuals who left GSSSS Camp for Gwoza LGA. The main movement triggers include poor living conditions and voluntary relocation.

**Numan:** 682 arrivals and 80 departures were recorded at Numan LGA of Adamawa State. These include 653 individuals who fled Bare ward of Numan LGA due to fear of attacks, arriving at Imburu ward of Numan; 29 individuals who arrived at Sabon Pegi ward of Numan LGA from Demsa LGA, on account of fear of attacks; and 80 individuals who left Sabon Pegi ward of Numan LGA for Yola-North LGA of Adamawa State due to fear of attacks. Many of the affected IDPs are in urgent need of shelter, food and water.

**Gwoza:** 551 arrivals were recorded in Gwoza LGA of Borno State. These include 236 arrivals at the Transit Camp in Pulka from Cameroon, 73 arrivals at the Pulka Transit Camp from surrounding wards, 202 arrivals at Bulabulin/Wakane ward of Gwoza from Hong LGA in Adamawa State and 40 arrivals at Wakane from Maiduguri. The main movement triggers include poor living conditions and voluntary relocation.

**Guzamala:** 261 arrivals were recorded in Guzamala LGA of Borno State. The arrivals included people fleeing from recent conflict along Veterinary area of Monguno LGA and others who left Monguno due to fears of insecurity and poor living conditions.

IOM's Emergency Tracking Tool (ETT) is deployed in Nigeria's northeastern states. Only Local Government Areas (LGAs) in which the IDP population changed since the latest DTM round of assessments are represented in this report. The data has been collected by DTM staff deployed at the locations listed and cross-checked with the partners present on the ground.
