1.0	WELCOME, INTRODUCTION AND OPENING REMARKS	None
	The Chairman sent a representative as he was unavoidably absent. The meeting was presided by the Food Security Sector Coordinator who welcomed partners to the meeting and called for self-introductions.

3.0	CADRE HARMONISE UPDATE The Programme Coordinator for the cadre harmonise gave a summary of the cadre harmonise processes, taking partners through the analytical frame work of the analysis, key points & approach, CH steps, roles of participant and expectation from partners amongst others. He informed partners that the cadre harmonise will be conducted in 5 centres stating the states in each centre and the venue. He concluded by informing partners that the analysis will commence at state level from 23 rd October, 2017, National consolidation workshop 30th October, 2017 and the Report presentation Workshop on 3 rd November 2017.	
	 COMMENTS FAO representative stated that all NGOs & INGOs will be invited and urged partners to participate actively in the analysis in order to get a consensus. WFP added that partners with any information that can strengthen the analysis data should provide them. 	

UPDATE ON THE POPULATION DATA The CH Coordinator reported that partners in Abuja held a meeting and agreed to use the VTS population data for the CH analysis but that they will hold another meeting on Thursday with Government for acceptability ROADMAP FOR FOOD AND NUTRITION SECURITY EARLY WARNING 4.0 SYSTEM (EWS) FOR NIGERIA Mr. Mainu gave an overview of the roadmap for food security early warning system for Nigeria. Stating that the general objective of this activity is to consolidate network development support towards a well-coordinated; well-structured, sustainable food security early warning system (EWS) for Nigeria. Listing the expected results of the supports to be: ✓ Proposal for the development of EWS in Nigeria, ✓ A roadmap, jointly articulated by FEWS NET and key food security. partners including CILSS, WFP, FAO, and the National Food Security Program (NPFS), Present to government, partners and donor agencies for adoption and funding and the progress so far he listed as follows: ✓ Draft road map outline shared with the respective country team saddled with the responsibility to develop such and ✓ NPFS has accepted to lead the process and as the lead agency will be responsible in sending the invitation letter for the subsequent meeting, A meeting with EWS Desk officers is scheduled for October, 11th, 2017: review of draft outline and development of road map. Presentation will be circulated for more details COMMENTS FAO stated that it is very appreciative and acknowledged the importance of the leadership by NPFS. 5.0 2017 SEASONAL RAINFALL PREDICTIONS AND EVALUATION BY NIMET NIMET representatives with the use of maps and graphics from the satellite

NIMET representatives with the use of maps and graphics from the satellite they gave a comprehensive presentation on the Seasonal Rainfall Prediction (SRP) and the evaluation/Performance of Rainfall in fulfilment of its mandate to effectively monitor the nation's climate and weather and provide necessary early warning advisories.

Stating that the timely preparation & release of the SRP is to enhance preparedness against predicted climate risks and hazards. Thus, the SRP assists decision makers and disaster managers at the various levels of governance to put in place adaptation and mitigation strategies.

	The SRP is therefore an invaluable tool which is capable of ameliorating the unpleasant consequences of extreme weather and climate events.	
	The proper application of the SRP reduces climate-related risks, enhances production, security and revenue generation.	
	NiMet seeks to use the SRP and its other key products to assist government achieve its programs in the current agricultural policy which include: The achievement of self-sufficiency in basic food supply and the attainment of food security; Increase in the production of agricultural raw materials for industries;	
	Increase in the production and processing of export crops, using improved production and processing technologies; Job creation within the agricultural value chain and,	
	Improvement in the quality of life of citizens' particularly rural dwellers resulting in poverty eradication.
