1. Operational overview

Food Security Livelihoods Cluster



Cumulative Summary since the 24 February:

- **Individuals Reached:** **6.7 million** people (approx.) have been assisted through either completed or ongoing activities
- **Reporting to cluster:** A total of **40 organisations** have submitted their 5Ws to the Cluster.
- **Locations:** **24 Oblasts and Kyiv** have been reported (Approx.) – The highest reached figures were reported in Kharkivska (1.7m), Kyivska (640k), Dnipropetrovska (504k), Poltavaska (440k), Zaporizka (406k).
- **Livelihood Activities:** **Four** Organisations have reported ongoing/ completed distribution of Emergency Agricultural Inputs. In total 15 Oblasts were covered, with total Reach of: **105k**
- **Top 3 Activities** (approx.): Hot meals: **940k** / General Food Distribution: **1.7m** / Rapid Response Rations: **3.9m**

Reporting: 5Ws and Pipeline



- **New Reporting: Bi-Monthly**
- **Important:** Please submit **only** the **last two weeks** of activities (unless you have not reported to the cluster before or have revisions to previous weeks, in which case, provide a cumulative report)
- **5Ws Deadline:** Every second Tuesday COB (twice a month)
- Next deadline is COB Tuesday 14 June (to info.ukraine@fsccluster.org), pipeline plans remain on a weekly basis.
- The 5Ws should capture 'new people reached' therefore please ensure you pay close attention to the new template circulated; in addition to using only the drop-down options for activities and locations.
- Note Beneficiary Counting Guidance- we need to capture NEW beneficiaries to the extent possible.

Food Security Livelihoods Cluster



The winter months in Ukraine can be very harsh with average temperatures between -8 to -12 degree Celsius.

Winter related needs will change significantly, particularly for conflict-affected populations – and any gap in assistance may have life-threatening consequences.

The situation will have significant humanitarian implications in view of potential risks in terms of shelter, fuel and energy sectors.

During this period, food security needs intensify, with substantially increased energy requirements (by 2100 kcal per person per day, with every drop of 5 C below 20 C (see below).

Lots of cereal storage and livestock farms have been destroyed.

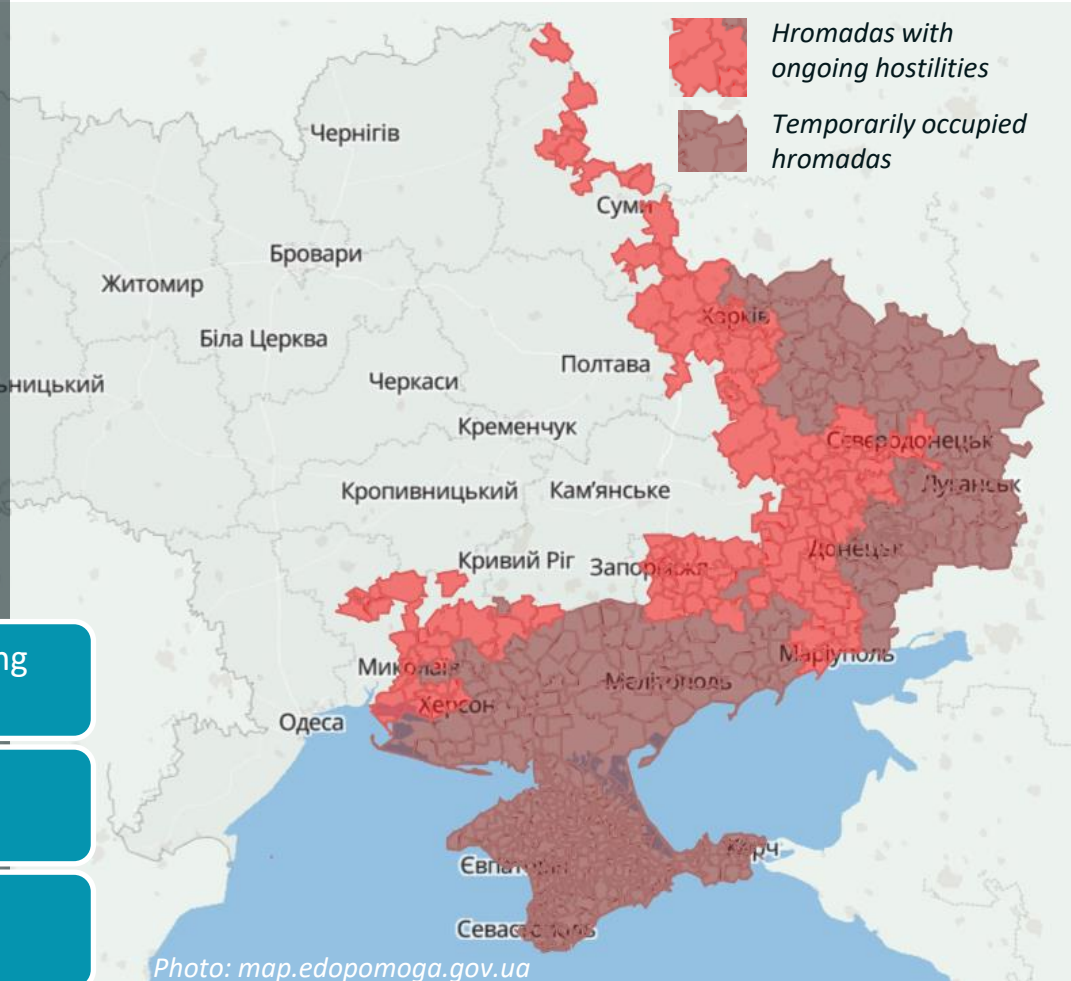

Still Under assessment on vulnerable people now and still trying to understand who is the most in need, still quite fluid.

Concerns on sufficiency of the MPC value, because what we have noticed is that even in places where people are receiving cash, they are still seeking support for food.

Side note: MEB – 56% should be on food purchases + other essential items. CWG needs to be a collective decision, we need evidence to inform the MPC value and that needs to be thru post-distribution monitoring hasn't
