

Principles of Rationalization

Principle 1. Consult with Sectors/Working Groups before engaging in an activity

Principle 2. Ensure that implementing partners meet basic requirements

Principle 3. Adopt an integrated approach (An integrated approach aims to improve (a) intersectoral camp-based coordination, (b) service delivery to refugees and host communities, and (c) relations with the Government (in particular, with CiCs).

Principle 4. Ensure predictability and continuity

Principle 5. Ensure the right partners respond in cases of emergencies

Principle 6. Ensure transparency of information



Next steps

Finalization of rationalization criteria for FSS together with SAG.

By the end of June: Stakeholder consultations with key agencies to determine how partner selection is being considered for the 2023 JRP.

By the end of July: endorse a common inter-sectoral process on JRP partner selection and peer review process; review the principles document to determine if updates are needed.

General Food Assistance (GFA)



General Food Assistance Updates (June Update)



Food assistance

- Food Assistance (with 10 Fixed and 20 Flexible item) support is continuing by the General Food Assistance team through 21 e-voucher outlets located at Rohingya Refugee Camp and 30% vulnerable HHs is also receiving FFC Voucher support from 20 FFC (19 Outlet).
- To ensure purchase enough food to meet family needs, GFA has adjusted the monthly value voucher 12 USD to 13 USD (BDT 1,122.94) per person (USD exchange rate) and Top Up for FFC support remain same amount, 3\$=259.14/ individual
- All 21 outlets will follow the normal operation- multiple visit/second time visit to be allowed (especially fresh food items (FFC))
- In May 2022, a total 2809 Households excluded temporarily from SCOPE/BB reload, most of them - who didn't redeem their voucher for last 3 more months consistently (February-April 2022).



Sector Objectives



The core role of the Shelter/NFI Sector is to coordinate partners assistance and agree on common shelter/NFI standards, avoid gaps and duplications.

SNFI Sector has 15 JRP partners and 23 active partners (UN, AFAD, NGO, INGO)

• Objective 1:

Provide lifesaving emergency Shelter/NFI support to households affected by disasters and other shocks

- Objective 2:

Provide safe and dignified living conditions to reduce suffering

Shelter activities in the camps

- Emergency shelter assistance
- Regular shelter assistance

- Porter assistance to HHs with EVIs
- Labour assistance to HHs with EVIs

Emergency shelter assistance

Preparedness

- Monsoon preparedness: tying down of shelter roofs, tightening connections, cleaning of HH-level drains
- <u>Contingency stock for cyclones</u>: 1 tarpaulin, 1 kg 6mm rope, 2 floor mats per HH

REGULAR shelter assistance

Mid Term Shelters (MTS)

Currently only one approved design: 150 sq.ft. for HH with up to 6 members and 300 sq.ft. for 7 and above

Transitional Shelter Assistance

- Blanket assistance across camps
- Incremental Shelter reinforcement using pointssystem, includes training for HHs. With use of treated bamboo and metal footing
 - TSA I (2019), TSA II (2020-21), SUM (2022)

Repair and maintenance

• Assessment based, provision of materials for repair of shelters





RATIONALIZATION



Today, almost a million Rohingya refugees are living in camps and settlements in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh. Daily life is dominated by the search for food and water, and coping with difficult, sometimes dangerous living conditions. The Rohingya population consists of a large working age population with 45 per cent adult, 51 per cent children & adolescent and only 4 per cent elderly. (UNHCR population fact Sheet Jan 2022).

AMAN underscores the importance of enabling learners to use their education towards sustainable futures. Improved access to skill training opportunities play a fundamental role in the process of supporting refugees to gain market relevant skills, and strengthen their capacity to lead independent and fulfilling lives. AMAN intends to empower Rohingya women and girls through life-skills training at the camp for their income and employment generation so that they can lead a healthy and happy life with dignity.

INDICATOR / OBJECTIVE

Support capacity building of Rohingya refugees that can support their sustainable reintegration in Myanmar, while ensuring climate resilient practices to address the impacts of climate change.

The centers were established in 1st Feb'20. The centers were closed from April'20 to Jan'22 due to COVID-19 pandemic as per the instruction of RRRC.

IMPACT



The Rohingya Refugees who have arrived in Bangladesh with very few possessions or with empty pocket. They are now dependent on charitable aid for food, shelter, health service, education and other life-saving essential goods and supports.

Considering the above situation, AMAN started the skill-based training on Sewing Machine Operation and Handicraft items making and marketing for Rohingya Refugee women; keep them in right track and make them self-reliant gradually.

These skill development trainings will provide them with an opportunity to be engaged in livelihood activities and improve their food security.






Partner Updates
