#### IMMEDIATE RESPONSE

Prior to and after the Cyclone, 5,589 Rohingya refugees staying in designated safe havens in the camps received emergency rations of fortified biscuits. More than 11,500 hot meals were distributed to refugees with a total of 6,221 Rohingya reached with the emergency food assistance package and 2,000 people reached with complementary dry foods. In addition, 5,601 Bangladeshi households were provided with BDT 4,100 (USD 39) each in advance of forecasted storm surge flooding, through WFP's Forecast-based Anticipatory Actions, allowing them to better prepare for its impact, and over 500 Bangladeshi households each received around BDT 5,115 (USD 48) as multipurpose cash grants in Sabrang union, Teknaf. More than 4,800 dry food packages and 600 hot meals to Bangladeshi host communities were distributed in cyclone shelters in Teknaf and Ukhiya. WFP and FAO are working together with food security partners to consolidate the sectoral needs assessment.

Rohingya Refugee Response and the Humanitarian Country Task Team issued joint Flash Appeal to respond to the damage caused by Cyclone Mocha, and to enhance preparedness and response capacity for the upcoming monsoon season.

A total of USD 42.16 million is required to support affected refugee Bangladeshi communities, and including USD 36.53 million under the Rohingya Refugee Response and USD 5.63 million for Bangladeshi communities in Teknaf

Myanmar, the humanitarian community also launched today a USD 333 million Flash Appeal to assist 1.6 million people affected by Cyclone Mocha.

## SOP - Emergency Food Distribution at Refugee camp

#### **Minimum Standards for Emergency Rapid Food Assistance**

Table 1. Minimum standards and specifications for modalities of rapid food distribution:

Assistance Type	Details	Timeline	Duration/Frequency
Fortified Biscuits (FB)	100 (50g) packets per family or equivalent	Within first 24 hours of emergency response	Repeated as needed (led by WFP for all affected persons)
Hot Meals (Lunch and Dinner)	Per individual:  Boiled Rice (400 gm)  Mixed Vegetables (200gm)  Thick dal/lentils (200gm)  TOTAL (800 gm)	Lunch: 1100-1300 hrs Dinner: 1600 - 1800 hrs	Daily – begin within 24 hours of emergency and continue until access to basic provisions are restored and HHs are on evouchers.
Complementary Dry Foods	As recommended/ requested by refugees (Per HHs)  Bread 2 packets (40 slices)  Puffed rice (1kg)  Molasses / Sugar (0.5kg)  Biscuit packets (5 packets, 400 gm)  Peanut (1kg)  Pulse  Chickpeas  Flatten rice  fruit/ local fruits (depends on availability)	Breakfast: Refugees have noted preference for early morning distributions (0800 – 1000 hrs), to suffice until hot meals distributions, and ease of carrying.	1-2 times weekly – continue until access to basic provisions are restored and HHs are on evouchers.

## Camp or Block Wise Targeting Approach

To avoid overcrowding not just of implementing actors but of beneficiaries as well, as well as to ensure Accountability to the Affected Population, the Food Security Sector recommends implementing actors to plan for rapid food distribution targeting entire camps or entire camp blocks as capacity allows, for at least 1 full day of hot meals – lunch and dinner hot meals for all affected individuals in the camp or camp block.

## <u>SOP for Emergency Rapid Food Assistance</u> during Multi-Hazard Emergency Response for Rohingya Refugees in Cox's Bazar

- 1. First draft of SOP sent to WFP/GFA for review (18 April)
- 2. WFP/GFA share feedback to FSS (27 April) Done
- 3. FSS to present draft to partners at coordination meeting (with GFA support) (2 May)
- 4. After partner inputs FSS to share draft with ISCG (Early to Mid-May)
- 5. FSS/ISCG to present SOP at Inter-Sector + ROCT meetings (there may be inputs esp. from ROCT)
- 6. FSS to incorporate feedback from the ROCT (support from GFA) (Mid-End of May)
- 7. Final Draft to be shared with ISCG for RRRC endorsement (June)

#### **General Food Assistance – Ration Cuts Overview**

- Starting June 2023, WFP will cut food voucher value from \$10 to \$8 per person per month.
- WFP provides food assistance to the Rohingya population in 33 camps.
- If more funds don't arrive soon, voucher value will need to be cut even further.

#### ANTICIPATED CONSEQUENCES ON THE POPULATION



Widespread decline in food security and nutrition outcomes, such as food consumption, dietary diversity, wasting, and stunting.



Sharp reduction in micronutrient-rich food consumption, and a worsening of micronutrient deficiencies.



Adoption of dangerous coping strategies (e.g., selling possessions, and accepting risky, exploitative jobs).



Increased violence and insecurity in the camps, and increased risks of bartering food assistance.

Note: General food assistance (GFA) information dissemination for the Rohingya community should be coordinated with the WFP GFA Team (@Rokibul ALAM, Head of GFA in cc) – as a note for the CwC Working Group. However, if direct engagement is needed, It's important that we stick to common messaging (Revised key Messages document) to avoid any confusion, prevent rumors, and reduce any security risks.

#### 1. Reduced entitlement of the food voucher:

- WFP has to reduce the entitlement of the food voucher from USD 10 to USD 8, starting from June 2023.
- It is not specific to any individual or household, rather it will be applied to everyone equally.
- The reduced entitlement only affects the food voucher you receive from WFP. Other entitlements, for example, nutrition, are not affected and will remain the same as before.
- The reduced entitlement may have an effect on the nutritional status of you and your family. Young children, pregnant and breastfeeding women, people with disabilities and older persons are usually the most affected. To minimize the impact of the reduced entitlement, there are a few things you can do: With the voucher, you can still purchase a maximum of 13 kg of rice/per person/month and use the remainder on fresh food items.
- Eat all the food you purchase from the e-voucher outlet, this is especially important now that you are not receiving the same amount of food as before. Young children, pregnant and breastfeeding women need more nutrition so try to take care of them as much as possible.
- If you have any concerns about the food assistance you receive, whether they are about the voucher amount or food quality or quantity you purchased from an outlet, please feel free to inform the WFP outlet staff immediately while inside the outlet (before leaving).

#### 2. Reduced entitlement of soap:

- Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) sector has to decrease the number of bathing soaps you receive each month. From June 2023, you will receive one bathing soap per person per month instead of two bathing soaps.
- Other entitlements from WASH assistance packages are not affected and will remain the same as before.

#### 3. Adjusted LPG distribution cycle:

• UNHCR is distributing pressure cookers which save time and gas when cooking. Starting in June 2023, the LPG refill cycle will be adjusted for refugees who have received pressure cookers. The adjustment is based on a detailed survey and research to reflect actual LPG consumption.
