May 17th, 2021 - Minutes of Meeting - West Bank & Gaza Strip

 The meeting started by Hosni Barakat welcoming participants and thanking them for their availability for this meeting under this situation of instability in Gaza due to escalated hostilities for the last eight days.

1. Update the current situation and ways to coordinate emergency interventions

Anas (FSS)

Date & venue:

- The Inter-Agency Contingency Plan (IACP) was activated by the humanitarian (HC) two days ago, and today (Monday May 17th) the first meeting of the was conducted Emergency Coordination Center (ECC). The ECC members are OCHA, cluster coordination team and cluster lead agencies as well as PNOG and AIDA and other counterparts.
- According to the plan:
 - ✓ UNRWA will designated 50 schools to serve as shelters to host up to 100K Internal displaced People (IDPs). UNRWA and WFP will cover the basic food needs for those IDPs.
 - ✓ The IDPs outside designated shelters (informal shelters, public places, with hosting families ...etc.) will be served by WFP and other FSS partners will be served through the FSS partners, working group members and other humanitarian actors.
- Till the moment (the day of the meeting), food assistance wasn't provided to the IDPs inside UNRWA DESs by WFP/UNRWA, however, a meeting will be conducted during the day between both organizations to arrange for the food assistance for those IDPS.
- FSS was working through the EPWG to update the matrix of "Partners' Capacity" to investigate the potentialities of providing food and livelihoods relevant assistance to the affected people mainly for those outside the designated shelters. The update matrix (<u>attached to this minutes of meeting</u>) will be used as a guiding document to provide different

types of assistance in the different phases of the emergency (during conflict, within the humanitarian space, post conflict, and the early recovery).

Salah (WFP):

- Over the weekend WFP with its partners assisted 56,776 (the number is subject to daily increase) people in need from North Gaza Governorate affected by the ongoing crisis. This food assistance is crucial as families fleeing their homes have lost their food.
- Food needs have increased significantly for WFP beneficiaries during this week, also due to receiving displaced people.
- WFP continues monitoring the food security situation on the ground. The initial observation from the field shows a significant increase of food and non-food needs for affected people and host families.

Luay (MoSD)

- The MoSD has developed a detailed response plan to serve affected people in the emergency; the \$70M plan is proposed to cover the needs of affected and displaced families with food, non-food assistance as well as rental subsidies for a one year for those with house destructions.
- The MoSD mentioned that If there are more IDPs, the government will work in opening new
 DESs to host around 35K IDPs. The governmental DESs will be managed by the MoSD in cooperation with the relevant clusters/sector and the humanitarian actors.
- MoSD is responsible for the dissemination of lists of affected persons for the organizations. MoSD has a complete database that will include all IDPs in urban settings. A high level of coordination and daily cooperation is well-established between MoSD and FSS to provide the better coordination. Organizations are kindly requested to include both MoSD commissioner Mr. Luay Al-Madhoun (l.elmadhoun@mosa.gov.ps) and FSS Gaza operations Coordinator Anas Musallam (anas.musallam@fscluster.org) in their communication regarding planning and implementation of the assistance. FSS will utilize the partners' capacities upon the consolidated capacity matrix filled by partners in the different phases of the emergency.
- MoSD communicated with UNRWA to coordinate the database of IDPs inside DESs in order to use for cleaning data and to avoid duplication in service.
- FSS and other clusters is coordinating with OCHA the necessity of providing a safe access for humanitarian actors to provide the humanitarian assistance in the communities.
- WFP activated the logistic Cluster (LC) to support the movement of humanitarian assistance into Gaza through the crossing borders.
- In the agriculture, FSS reminded that the matrix includes a section for the animal fodders as it is important element to be considered for livestock and poultry breeders.
- The MoA alarmed the sever decrease of animal fodders in the local market, and this is threatening the livelihoods of 17,000 herding households depending on livestock as the main/solely source of livelihoods. On the crossing border of Kerem Shalom, there is some 1,000 tons of fodders stuck and need to urgently enter to Gaza breeders. FAO and FSS are working to find a space for opening the crossing border to facilitate entering of animal fodders.

• MoA in Gaza assigned different focal points of its staff in each governorate to receive farmers and breeders' calls reporting their damages with names and mobile numbers are published in the ministry's web page. The actual damage assessment in the field. MoA is the one responsible for damage assessment and dissemination lists of affected farmers and breeders, however, all agricultural organizations are welcomed to support the damage assessment process.

2. AoB

- FSS has a list of focal points in the five governorates to report any emergency, need, price monitor and any emerging issue related the agriculture and food security in general. - Save Youth Future Society (SYFS) has a youth volunteers network across Gaza Strip who are active on ground (61 youth groups across governorates) and willing & ready to support all FSS partners in response/ intervention.
