



Scarcity in certain products

- All shops were functional in April 2023;
- Stock levels in April 2023 remain stable;
- Shops with more than 2 weeks of stock coverage at 72 percent;
- Scarcity in products 1 percent, compared to 4 percent in December 2022, 24 percent in August and 35 percent in July 2022, due to bread availability issues;
- Delivery of products within one week affected mainly by fuel availability. Continue to register high levels, at 100 percent in April 2023;
- Suppliers delivering full ordered quantities remains high at 99 percent.

Monthly:

The consumer price index increased by 9 percent between March-23 and April-23, while energy prices increased by 6 percent and food prices by 15 percent for the same time period;

Yearly:


The consumer price index increased by 269 percent between April-22 and April-23, while energy prices increased by 283 percent and the food prices increased by 350 percent for the same time period.

In the Food Security Update report released on the 20th of April 2023 by the World Bank, Lebanon recorded the highest food price inflation rate globally between February 2022 and February 2023, followed by Zimbabwe.




INFORMAL MARKET RATE STABILIZED AT AROUND LBP94,000/USD

Timeline of the Exchange Rates' Variations and Central Bank interventions (Mar 22 - May 23)





- After loosing 49 percent of its value between January and March 2023, the Lebanese Pound gained strength in April as the informal exchange rate descended from LBP116,830/USD on April1st to BP94,450/USD on April30th
- Average informal market rate in April 2023: LBP97,800/USD
- Average informal market rate in April 2023: LBP94,600/USD
- In April 2023, government announced that VAT will no longer be calculated based on the official rate (LBP15,000/USD) as issued through a cabinet decree on April 18, and published in the Official Gazette on April 27




Food SMEB and MEB in LBP (per person)






Non-Food Items (NFI) SMEB and MEB in LBP (per household)







Gasoline prices



- Between May 2022 and May 2023:
 - The price of 20 litres of motor fuels (Octanes 98 and 95) increased by 195 percent;
 - The price of 20 litres of diesel increased by 117 percent;
 - The price of a 10Kg gas can increased by 128 percent.
- During April 2023, the caretaker Minister of Energy and Water launched the "Lebanon Fuel Price" electronic application, which provides regular updates of the price of motor fuel (98 and 95 octane), gas cylinder and diesel as well as the exchange rate applied by the ministry.

Agriculture Mapping exercise

- The objective of this exercise is to ensure all organizations and mainly MoA has an overall overview and understanding of the projects in the agriculture sector, to avoid regional gaps and ensure greater coverage of assistance.
- The mapping was done through Activity Info.

LHF first standard allocation for 2023



- The 2023 LHF allocation has been launched. Deadline for submitting projects was 4 June.
- Food Security (\$3.5 million): (Akkar, Tripoli, Zahle + flexibility to implement in Marjeyoun)
- Activities:
 - Food assistance through Cash Based Transfer (Food Vouchers, Financial Service Provider FSP, ATM etc.)
 - Direct food provision through in-kind assistance (dry rations).
 - Fresh food provision (preferred method cash based).

Integrated Phase Classification (IPC) Acute Food Insecurity (AFI)



The second round of Integrated Phase Classification (IPC) Acute Food Insecurity (AFI) analysis in Lebanon took place between 22 and 31 May 2023.

The IPC is a set of tools and procedures to classify the severity and characteristics of acute food and nutrition crises as well as chronic food insecurity based on international standards.

The workshop was attended by experts including Technical Working Group members and analysts UN organizations, international and national NGOs, technical agencies, and governmental institutions.

The data used in the analysis was organized according to the IPC analytical framework and entails food insecurity contributing factors, outcome indicators, and multiple secondary sources.



Partners updates



- **RMF:** The market study in North and Akkar was finalized, 5 Value Chains were selected (onion, pomegranate, aromatic plants, peanuts...) Outreach phase started. The implementation of the project will start in July.
- **PCPM:** Supporting 600 Syrian and Lebanese families in Dreib Gharbe, Dreib Awsat, Akkar chmele and wadi Khaled with Food assistance over 3 months. Target reached. Providing dry food and fresh food including dairy and meat through refrigerated van. It is a pilot project, and the findings will be shared soon.
- ANERA: Conducting last round of food distribution and the 4th round of cash assistance distribution. Target for Akkar and Tripoli 1261. This project will end in July.
- AND: Planning for 2 community kitchens (one in Jered al Qaitaa and one in sahel area). The project duration is 8 months (4months for al Jered area and 4 months for al Sahel area) starting July. 1000 hot meals /day will be delivered.
- Criteria: Women headed household, pregnant women, breastfeeding women, and elderly.



Partners updates



• Care: BASATINE has commenced distribution of E-vouchers worth \$500 through OMT for the redemption of agriculture inputs (around 3900 farmers). BATCH 1 has been completed and BATCH 2 will be launched soon. The BASATINE Program has conducted a land tenure study, which is currently under internal review. It will be presented at FSAS WG upon completion. Gender equality and social inclusion study in North and Bekaa area will be conducted. The Farm Field Business School/Gender Transformative Approach (FFBS/GTA) will begin next month with care participants.

Regarding the GESI study under the AFDAL project, the GEWE and GESI for the North and South were consolidated in one report as requested by WFP gender department. The report is being validated before publication.

• **WFP:** WFP continue to respond to the economic crisis through the IN-KIND food assistance in partnership with Caritas, DCL and WV. Current Target is 75,331HHs all over Lebanon with 22,161 HHs divided between Akkar (9,132 HHs) and T5 (13,029 HHs).

The distributions are targeting the multiple districts of Akkar, Minnieh-Dennieh, Tripoli, Koura, Zgharta, Bcharre and Batroun.



Economic Crisis Response for Lebanese

WFP's crisis response supports the most vulnerable Lebanese families to meet their food needs through the monthly distribution of in-kind food parcels.



Initially adopted to mitigate COVID-19 related risks, WFP continues to provide in-kind food assistance in the face of inflation and threats to food access and availability.

Based on beneficiary feedback, WFP is optimizing the food basket and frequency of distributions to better meet the needs of assisted households.

WFP implements the economic crisis response in the area covered by North Field Office together with its Cooperating Partners through a monthly food parcels distribution in T5 & Akkar.

Economic Crisis Response for Lebanese

WFP's target through the crisis response is to support 75,600 Lebanese households (Around 300,000 unique individuals) and provide a safety net for the most vulnerable while large-scale social assistance programmes, namely the National Poverty Targeting Programme (NPTP) and the Emergency Social Safety Net (ESSN) scale-up.










WV's Distribution data

UNHCR REFERRAL HEALTH CARE PROGRAMME CHANGES AS OF 1ST OF MAY 2023

- 1. Refugee to pay their patient share at Sayrafa rate
- 2. UNHCR coverage for delivery care to be reduced to 50%
- 3. Ceiling for coverage of expensive medical interventions to be decreased (12k instead of 15k for NICU & Burn, 10k instead of 15k for other conditions)
- 4. Coverage support to only those known to UNHCR with an active file

The project consists of a 24 months intervention to equip youths in Beirut, Mount Lebanon, and Bekaa with the skills and links needed to (re-)enter the labour market either as micro-/small-business entrepreneurs or as skilled employees.

The project further seeks to empower the youths (50% Syrian refugee youth and 50% other conflict-affected youth, equally targeting men and women) and increase their self-reliance thereby minimizing negative coping strategies, protecting them from exploitation, and improving their mental health.

- Emkan engages in community development by improving the livelihoods of marginalized people by stimulating economic activities through the implementation of sustainable projects and capacity building.
- We focus on integrating local resources throughout the entire supply & value chains.


Agriculture

- 1. Full development of lands to yield various crops that are in line with European Regulations
- 2. Provide assessment visits & training activities to farmers
- 3. We work with MoA & Army in the protection of lands from widescale fires and pathogens
- 4. Introduced new apple varieties in 75 new pilot orchards
- 5. Established 34 pilot (avocado, apples and cherry) orchards in partnership with USAID
- 6. Cattle & goat farms (under development)
- Cultivation of animal feed & wheat (under development)
- Hydroponic farming (under development)
- 9. Shrimp and sea-bass farms (under development)
- 10. Forest trees and fruit trees nursery (under development with MoA)









Agro-Industry

- 1. Emkans owns Berrad Feideq, the only cold storage facility in Fneideq and adjacent areas (High end & most affordable) with a capacity of 1100 Tons
- 2. We are currently expanding the facility to start processing fruits into various products (damaged apples small sizes undesirable for trade)
- 3. Emkan owns a sorting facility (in addition to 6 cold storage rooms and a packaging zone) in the area of al A'abda, this facility can be used to help local farmers package, market and export their products.
- 4. Emkan made an agreement with the MoA to renovate and operate a hangar located on Al'Abda's main road to showcase local products
- 5. Emkan made an agreement with the MoA to renovate and operate 2 milk collection facilities (one in Wadi Khaled, the 2nd in Al'Abdeh) located in critical locations that house thousands of farmers with no access to sell their milk but exploitive traders who force them to sell milk cheaply.
- 6. Dairy factory (under development)







Trade & Export

- 1. Emkan is trying to reach new markets to sell local products (fruits & vegetables (directly from farmers), dairy products, processed and home-made products), this includes the support of household production, branding, quality control and marketing. This project is paired with an initiative to provide women working at home with ingredients, packaging and tools to produce high quality products, which will then be sold by Emkan on behalf of them
- 2. In 2021, Emkan bought 10% of the apple yield in Fneideq and adjacent areas. This move was done to support farmers financially and break the exploitation cycle enforced by brokers as the apples were bought with a high price, therefore increasing the standard price and offering and alternative.
- 3. We faced 4 problems:
 - A. A large amount of the product is visually undesirable (that is why we are: 1. initiating agro-processing, 2. finding new markets).
 - B. The 3rd problem is ill-practices when it comes to picking up and storing of apples & fruits which results in damaging them (we are teaching farmers in best practices of picking, sorting and storing).
 - C. Challenges in shipping
 - D. Competitive prices from other countries
- 4. Emkan owns Souk Akkar, the only wholesale market in the area (76 shops) for fruits and vegetables, which acts as portal for the second largest agricultural production area in Lebanon. This market helps sustain the development of both farmers and traders in the Northern region. This facility is great to source fruits and vegetables for the best prices (although we aim to directly source all products from farmers directly)









Research & Development

- 1. Emkan owns Akkar's agricultural center which covers an area of 22,000 m2. This project was funded by the Kuwaiti Fund for Arab Economic Development.
- 2. We are planning to turn this center into a **development cluster** that houses NGOs and INGO's that work in the development of the Northern region especially in the domain of agriculture, agro-tech, agro-industries, SME's, incubators, COOPs and accelerators.







Action points
