













# Gu and Hagaa Review with Deyr Projection

#### Review of Gu 2023 Rainfall Performance - MAM




- ➤ The early onset of the generally above-LTM MAM rainfall led to substantial recharge of water sources, replenished water catchment levels, improved soil moisture conditions, creating favorable conditions for grassland regeneration, offering first line fodder for the livestock, land preparation and timely crop and fodder planting across the agro-pastoral livelihoods.
- ➤ However, the resultant floods at Bardheere form 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2023, at Belet Weyne from 9<sup>th</sup> May, at Bulo Burti from 25<sup>th</sup> May and at Jalalaqsi from 26<sup>th</sup> May 2023 led to extensive damage to the earlier-grown crop and fodder farmlands and the grassland plains with devastating implications.
- ➤ Nonetheless, the MAM rains generally led to improved food security situation across the country particularly in the case of Somaliland where the observed rains were above LTM.



#### **Cumulative Rainfall June**



## **Cumulative Rainfall July**




#### **Cumulative Rainfall Aug**



#### Deyr 2023 Forecast: El Niño & Positive IOD


#### Current forecasts indicate over 90% chance of El Nino in October - December 2023 rainy season





The combination of a confirmed Fl Niño event with a positive IOD has historically meant above average rainfall in East Africa




# IRI Multi-Model Probability Forecast for Precipitation: Increased probability of AN rains during SOND

## **Capacity Building**



#### As part of capacity strengthening and localization

- ☐ IPC Level 1 training 3rd -6th July 2023.
- > FSC together with the IPC Global Support unit held an Integrated Food Security Phase Classification (IPC) training for Food Security Partners in Kismayo for Jubaland.
- Approximately 40 participants both male and female from the UN, INGO, LNGO and the Four-line ministries (Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries and MOHADM) as well as a representative of the FSC from the office of the governor Jubaland who were trained.
- > The training aimed to equip the participants with the relevant methodology for classifying the magnitude and severity of food insecurity for informed response decisions.
- ☐ 3-day training in Kismayo from 14th 16th August 2023
- > The primary target of the training were FSC active organizations that are implementing/reporting food activities, or actively engage with the FSC through the coordination meetings.
- Around 40 participants were from LNGO, LNGO, UN, and government representatives. The staff selected were mostly the organization's food security focal points, M&E focal points, and/or the AAP/Protection/Cross-cutting issues focal points.
- The training content included :IM (monthly response, planned response and OPZ reporting etc.)Crosscutting/Targeting issues,Food Security IndicatorsDiscussions on Key Coordination Issues



- On 19<sup>th</sup> of July 2023, the FSC held a virtual meeting Projecting the Impact of El Nino for Anticipatory Action in Somalia with the FAO Presentation to Humanitarian Partners focusing on Juba land and Hirshabelle States which have a like hood of being affected.
- Action taken after the forecast in Jubaland state include regular meetings in regard to preparedness strategy.
- A MoHADM/OCHA multi-sectoral assessment is planned for the coming week:
- This will create awareness in the community on the potential impact of the anticipated el-nino with key messages developed in the local language.
- Key preparedness
- Some FSC partners as part of the preparedness and responses will have activities such as sandbag, gabions etc, however, this is still under discussion
