1. FSLC & wider collective response & resilience in our changing context
With the ever worsening food insecurity situation in South Sudan (6.9M people in the lean season), the FSL cluster emphasizes on scaled up humanitarian response with a focus on conditional food assistance and resilience building as well as encouraging multi-sectorial integrated response.

2. Pro-Resilience Action (PRO-ACT) by SSUDA. This presentation highlighted a 3-year project jointly implemented by SSUDA & Cordaid with an objective was to improve food security and disaster resilience of vulnerable communities in the 3 conflict affected Counties in Upper Nile State, (Panyikang, Makal and Fashoda). The key feedback from the FSLC members on the presentation emphasized the need for SSUDA/Cordaid to highlight project sustainability, impact, AAP/protection & inclusivity, conflict sensitivity and the lessons learnt.

3. Planning & preparation for the Round 24 FSNMS & ways to extract more information from the existing data sets – (WFP/ VAM).
The FSNMS is a nationwide biannual assessment that is mainly carried out approximately at post-harvest and lean seasons. The FSNMS analysis results are used in the IPC analysis workshops. The next FSNMS round 24 preparations are underway with the first activity of Training of Trainers scheduled to start in mid-May.

 - ✓ Sub national focal points in our changing context. In order to strengthen coordination at the sub national (state & county) levels, partners are encouraged to form coordination

units at the county levels and communicate their elected focal point to the national FSL cluster with the contact list of the members.

- ✓ SSHF reporting to FAO online. All partners that received SSHF funding in 2018 are all expected to report on the OCHA online GMS and the FAO online tool. Reporting in this two systems is mandatory and will affect partners score in future allocations.
