FSL Context and Operational Updates	 Situational update In a joint press statement released on 20 May, the two parties agreed to a seven-day ceasefire, renewing their commitment to the Jeddah Declaration, humanitarian arrangements, restoration of essential services, the withdrawal of forces from hospitals and clinics, the respectful burial of the dead and creation of a Monitoring and Coordination Committee (which sees the US and Saudi Arabia involved). The "step by step" approach agreed by both parties is set to continue and work towards a permanent cessation of hostilities. Deep concerns over the impact of the Sudan Crisis on the security, safety and stability for the Arab region were also expressed during the 32nd Arab League Summit by the League of Arab States—stating to avoid any external interference in Sudan's affairs that would fuel conflict and threaten regional peace and security. FSL Context and Operational Update The Sudan Conflict Crises is threatening the main planting season, which is set to begin at the end of May. If the season is missed, the number of people going hungry will increase. This additional threat to Sudan's food system will impact women the most. Before the crisis, 42% HHHs headed women already had less food compared to 31% of male HHHs, and women are eating less since the conflict began, (according to CARE). In addition, prolonged suspension of food assistance is anticipated to increase food insecurity in areas where aid was previously assessed to be preventing worse outcomes—especially in greater Darfur, parts of greater Kordofan and parts of greater Nile—(according to FEWS NET, which is reviewing the situation). 	 The prices of staple goods have risen dramatically, heightening the risk of food insecurity in the period ahead. Although markets are generally open in safe areas but besides price hikes there are shortages of imported goods such as wheat flour, oil, and tomato paste in nine locations across Sudan, (according to a market assessment conducted by Mercy Corps). In some areas, shops have closed because of insecurity or lack of goods. Access to cash remains a significant issue in Khartoum and South Darfur, while the increase in fuel prices and transportation costs has hindered both daily life and the ability of people to move out of insecure areas. However, insecurity and attacks against humanitarian and health facilities and supplies continue to hamper operations. Almost 28 humanitarian organizations have had their offices or stocks looted over the last three weeks in South Darfur alone and widespread lootings are considered as one of the main risks for the continuation and scale-up of humanitarian operations. Partners are delivering assistance, including food and lifesaving assistance, to people impacted by the fighting as well as those who were already in need. Updates on Displacement	 A total of 1,361,308 million people have been newly displaced, including 1,042,114 individuals were displaced internally while 319,914 individuals had crossed borders. The highest figures of displacement have been reported in West Darfur (23.86%), White Nile (19.65%), River Nile (15.64%) and Northern States (13.93%). To date, almost 319,194 people have arrived in neighboring countries: at least 80,000 people have arrived in neighboring Chad, 69,112 people in South Sudan, 132,364 people in Egypt, 26,818 people in Ethiopia, 9,823 people in the Central African Republic and 1,077 people in Libya since the start of the 	 Updated IDPs and Cross border movements will be shared with FSL on regular basis.

	<u>CRS:</u> CRS is still planning response focusing on MPCA and/or in-kind supports for vulnerable HHs and agricultural inputs to support the farmers, across Darfur, especially in ED. We have on-going projects from which we might be able to start activities, as situation evolves.	
	<u>UNDP</u> : UNDP has been working with FSL cluster coordinator in the revision of the HRP. UNDP plans to provide emergency income to affected population via debris management as well as the provision of seeds and inputs to farmers to save the planting season under PC1 activities.	
	 Save the Children: Save the Children has developed a multi-sectoral response plan following the outbreak of the current conflict. Priority areas for FSL includes food assistance, agricultural livelihoods (seeds and tools), livestock and MPCA. 	

	 SCI has wider operational presence in Sudan (NK, SK, CD, ND, WD, RS< BN, Khartoum) and will maintain those areas for the current response and possibly new areas with large number of IDPs; Working on ways to restart or modify some of the current projects that has been paused following the conflict; IOM: IOM is still in the planning stage looking at MPCA and other livelihood support. We are beginning with the Eastern states and Blue Nile and also exploring options in the Kordofans. A major hurdle is how we can ensure payments are received by national implementing partners due to issues with liquidity and access to FSPs. 		
	Concern Worldwide: CWW still working on response plan, still exploring logistics routes for potential supplies such as seeds etc especially when the rainy season is around the corner. Some of our operation areas not accessible, some with no connectivity. CWW is also planning for MPCA too.
