Impact on the supply chain and WFP contracted shops:	
 78 percent of WFP contracted shops have a stock for more than 2 weeks as of June 2020 (73 percent in July 2020) Weekly shops assessment survey: 10 percent of WFP contracted shops reported scarcity in certain products, such as flour, sugar, oil & fats 42 percent of WFP-contracted shops reported suppliers did not deliver the full ordered quantities 69 percent reported having subsidized items by the government at the rate of LBP 3,900 in their stocks. 43 percent reported that suppliers are accepting new orders for subsidized products. 	Contracted shops are trying to absorb the fluctuations of the prices and act as a buffer and not to leave too much stocks
Repercussions of explosion on weekly exchange rate	
 based on contracted retailers' feedback (national level) No major changes in exchange rates applied by suppliers of contracted shops following the explosion. 80 percent of WFP-contracted shops reported restocking their supplies using an exchange rate between 8,000-9,000 LBP (as of 7th August 2020) before dropping to 5 percent on August 27th, and zero percent on September 3rd, following the drop in the blackmarket exchange rate 	

• 19 percent of WFP-contracted shops were using an exchange rate between LBP 7,000 – 8,000. This increased to 97% as of September 3rd.

Daily exchange rate development between mid October 2019 and September 2020:

- Following the drop in the black-market, the exchange rate has been trading mostly between LBP 7,000 and 8,000 from mid August and onward
- Rate for withdrawal from non-fresh money dollar account in LBP continues to be set at LBP 3,900 by the central bank currency exchange platform
- Official exchange houses rate as set by the central bank currency exchange platform (Sayrafa) continues to be set at between LBP 3,850 & LBP 3,900

Lebanese Customs Imports Statistics Periods Comparison

- Total imports decreased by 41 percent in comparison to the same period in 2019 (first half of 2020).
- Food imports decreased by 9.4 percent, in comparison to the same period in 2019
- Cereal imports remained nearly unchanged in the first half of 2020, at an approximate total of 660 thousand tons, compared to nearly 641 thousand tons in the same period in 2019.

<u>Demand: food & non-food price developments and</u> exchange rate fluctuations

The Cost of the Food SMEB:

 The cost of the SMEB is higher than October levels by 168 percent The Central Bank decided on August 6 to resume paying incoming money transfer in US dollar notes for non-financial institutes. Last recorded rate was LBP 3,800.

		 At national level, the month on month variation of the food SMEB was minimal (up to 3 percent) At the governorate level, Beirut recorded the highest month on month increase (up 21.6 percent), followed by Mount Lebanon and Akkar (up 8.8 percent). 	stabilized
		 Non-Food Items (NFI) Monthly Price Development: Between October 2019 and August 2020, an increase of 170% was registered (65,244 LBP in October 2019 vs. 175,928 LBP in August 2020) for NFI The month on month NFI prices increased from +3.2 percent in November 2019 to +12.1 percent in August 2020.  Food Rations distributed to the families of 170 children who attended schools during the previous academic year.

- Mapping shows response coverage by region on the basis of partners/NGOs inputs (tracking mainly at regional levels
- Gaps identified in parts of Mount Lebanon and North, and South and through referrals try to fill these gaps for partners willing to support

The Online response tracking tool of partners is on hold for the time being

Agricultural activities under the LCRP regular programme

Data extracted from Activity Info (August 2020) show:

- Farmers signing contracts with retailer, and/or having access to market infrastructures: 156 (1 woman)
- Farmers provided with agriculture inputs/trainings: 77
- Farmers trained on Pest Management and Good Agriculture Practices and Standards (i.e pesticide use):

- Partners are requested to update regularly the databases under the Activity Info (LCRP and COVID-19 databases) and avoid duplications in both databases
- Partners are also requested to update regularly the Service Mapping in Activity Info

Individuals providing temporary/casual agricultural labor: 2,773

<u>Partners updates on current interventions in Food</u> Assistance:

- Islamic Relief: Eleven thousand food parcels for winterization for the coming six months, will be distributed mostly in Bekaa. Currently a project in Bekaa is distributing 2,300 food parcels and 400 food parcels will be distributed to women-headed households (for 4 months).
- CARE: presented a project under the LHF with OCHA as a response to COVID-19 and with LRC to provide food parcels. They can cover need of referral requests.
- **ShareQ**: After the Beirut Port Blast 20,000 hot meals were distributed to people. Now, they are providing vacuumed meals to individuals and hospitals that can be refrigerated up to 5 days.
- WFP: In September, under the Beirut Blast response, there will be a shift from in-kind to Multi-Purpose Cash (MPC) for Food and Non-Food items using the exchange rate in the parallel market.

Discussions on harmonization of the Cash values are on-going with concerned agencies/partners under the CBT task force of the Beirut Blast response.
