- SMEB TWG established core group to oversee SMEB revision
 - CMWG (OCHA & CCY), UNHCR, IRC, REACH Initiatives
- Core group activities:
 - Reviewed each SMEB component
 - a) Is the component contextually relevant and necessary (i.e., a basic need)?
 - b) If itemized, should the itemization be reviewed?
 - c) Price-based or expenditure-based?
 - d) Can we source new price or expenditure data?
 - e) Should we add any components?
 - a) Reviewed the 'survival' approach agreed a shift to minimum expenditure basket (MEB) to align with other regional contexts
 - b) Conduct gap analysis using available household income data
 - c) Reach out to Clusters for recommendations & data







OVERVIEW

- MEB remains a hybrid model (price- and expenditure-based)
- No change to the core components: Food, WASH, Shelter/NFI, Services
- Some changes to items within each component, and the sources of data used
- The MEB has increased in value







FOOD

The food component adopted the most recent Minimum Food Basket (MFB) UCT guidelines for a household of 7 people






GAP ANALYSIS

- Analysed monthly income data from over 17,000 households
- Income data was in bands could not calculate medians
- Large majority of households reported no income in past 30 days (66%)
- This will be exaggerated
- Almost all remaining households (28%) reported monthly income between YER 0-50,000
- Income data from UNHCR suggests the typical income to be closer to YER 25,000 per month
- Without continuous data, assumption is majority of households with income, that is below YER 50k, will earn around YER 25k

TRANSFER VALUE

- Lacking continuous income data, and under assumption that most households with income have approximately YER 25k at their disposal per month, MEB TWG proposes a deduction of YER 25,000 from both MEBs.
- Why? Will have better income data by December increasing MEB then
 decreasing with robust gap analysis will be difficult. I.e, YER 25k is a
 starting point, to be revised with better income data.
- North MEB: YER 122,000 / USD 220 (exchange rate: YER 556 / \$1)
- South MEB: YER 240,000 / USD 230 (exchange rate: YER 1,044 / \$1)







NEXT STEPS, COMMUNICATIONS, POLICY

- Monitoring & revision triggers:
 - > MEB TWG review on a quarterly basis, which is now aligned with FSAC and MFB; review of MFB, JMMI, household expenditure data
 - > If a change in either exchange rate greater than 25%, the CMWG will convene MEB TWG for review of available price data, and decide on whether full revision necessary
 - > MEB TWG also convened if FSAC makes any ad hoc changes to the MFB value
- Household income and expenditure survey, led by CMWG and REACH Initiatives will offer monthly expenditure data and robust household income data to inform future revisions
- Following endorsement, MEB Guidance Note will be shared by Sunday 11th September (or earlier) full disaggregation, monitoring policy, etc.
- JMMI changes: aim to add OTC medicines, sim cards
