- ↓ 47,617 beneficiaries were provided with and inkind assistance of 50% ration in Meme and Manyu divisions
- ♣ A total of 385.698Mt of food was distributed in the cycle.
- WFP together with FAO, MINSANTE, MINADER trained 101 enumerators for Comprehensive Food Security and Vulnerability Assessment(CFSVA) data collection SW, Littoral and western regions.

WFP NW

- ♣ Due to multiple lockdowns and delays in obtaining Authorization letters from the local authorities, In-kind food distributions began late and will only be reported in the month of June, as WFP does not conduct retroactive distributions for both food and cash.
- A total of 18,620 beneficiaries (12,579 females and 6,041 males) affected by the COVID19 pandemic were also assisted through unrestricted cash transfer in Momo, Bui, Mezam, and Ngo-Ketunjia by WFP Cooperating Partners, COMINSUD.
- Trained enumerators for CFSVA data collection in the NW region.

• IRC

- ♣ Emergency food security response from HQ planned to target 280 Households in New Bonako Tiko in the SW for June
- No activities carried out in May.

SHUMAS

- Supported women through livelihood projects in Bamenda
- ♣ Targeting to help 150 women in NWSW with livelihood activities.
- Trained 50 youths on agro-pastoral activities who inturn have to develop their projects for funding;

CRS

- Completed registration process for new project participants in Bamenda 1,2 &3, Santa, Tubah and Bafut
- ♣ 1750 Households were selected for 6 cycles of food and 1 cycle of NFI assistance.
