1. Action points from the last meeting:

2. FSAC response to the fire-affected families:

- FSAC indicated that alerts had been received from the Ex.U and the CCCM Cluster, reporting fire incidents in Marib City and Marib Wadi districts which affected 23 HHs.
- It has been outlined that the cluster partners, KSR and CRB, have responded to these families with one-off food assistance.



3. FSAC Partners' Monthly updates; ongoing response & gaps:

- In March 2022, a total of 597,782 individuals have been supported with emergency food assistance in five districts of Marib; Marib City, Marbi Wadi, Harib, Raghwan, and Al Jubah.
- For Livelihoods and CFW, **11,473** individuals have been accumulatively assisted with conditional cash transfer since January 2022 in two districts of Marib; Marib City and Marib Wadi.
- > For May updates, FSAC sub-cluster partners reported the following:
 - b) CARE has completed two UCT projects in Marib city and Marb Wadi districts.
 - c) NFDHR has finished its YHF project in Marib City and Marib Wadi districts.
 - d) Solidarities International is planning to target new **590** HHs with UCT for three consecutive rounds in Marib Wadi district.

- FSAC activities are implemented through principled and people-centred approaches, promoting the safety, dignity and integrity of people receiving assistance and equally considering the different needs of women, men, girls and boys.
- FSAC partners will provide assistance to enhance the investment of available resources to rehabilitate and protect damaged critical community infrastructure and livelihood services, based on the needs identified through the Food Security and Livelihoods Assessment (FSLA) and the subsequent IPC analysis.
- Stabilization of local food production, increased food availability and access, increased self- reliance, and support for investments in Yemenis' resilience will be among the top priorities.



5. 2022 FSAC Targets in Marib:

- By the Mid of May, FSAC new target for 2022 was released. Around 19 M of Yemeni people are in need for assistance, 17.4 M will be targeted with FSAC support.
- The 2022 HRP FSAC Target for Marib (Marib City, Marbi Wadi, Harib, Raghwan, Medghal and Al Jubah districts) is as follows:
 - e) Number of individuals targeted through emergency food assistance (in kind, cash or voucher transfers) on a monthly basis is **530,000** individuals.
 - f) Number of individuals targeted through emergency agricultural and livestock kits is 61,875 individuals.
 - g) Number of individuals targeted through conditional, season specific cash transfer to rehabilitate community assets, and infrastructure is 82,500 individuals.
 - h) Number of individuals targeted through livelihoods assets restoration support, assistance in establishing micro-businesses, and skills in enhancing employability is **20,625** individuals.

6. AOB:

6.1. Updates on the revised MFB:

On April 17th, 2022, the FSAC MFB Technical Working Group (TWG) recommended a revised value for the FSAC MFB, which was approved at the national cluster partners meeting on April 28th, 2022.



- The MFB transfer values are based on a rigorous analysis and assessment of food commodity price data from January to March 2022 (pegged on averages of WFP and FAO market data), as well as a food basket composition that fulfils 80-85 percent Kcal for a household size of 7.
- > The following are the two techniques that were endorsed:
 - a) Harmonized transfer value based on average household size of 7

The FSAC MFB will have a harmonised transfer value of YER 65,000/household/month in the northern governorates and YER 122,500/household/month in the southern governorates for a household of 7 persons. In the northern governorates, this equates to USD 109 per home per month, whereas in the southern governorates, it equates to USD 106 per household per month.

b) Differentiate food basket based on actual household size

Some FSAC partners can change transfer values based on the actual number of eligible household members for operational reasons. For households with 1-10 individuals, this would equal to the following transfer values:
