Overview



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Strengthening Humanitarian Response



- Providing immediate food and other humanitarian support to the cities such as Mariupol, Sumy, Kharkiv... is difficult and the humanitarian conditions in these cities continue to deteriorate. Therefore, there's an urgent need for humanitarian access to these cities.
- In Ukraine, the escalating war poses a clear threat to food security and the agriculture-based livelihoods of smallholders, although field assessments will be necessary to get firm data on damage, food security outcomes and needs.
- Prior to the expansion of hostilities, Eastern Ukraine was already exposed to eight years of armed conflict, isolation, deteriorating market and agricultural infrastructure, movement restrictions and the impacts of COVID-19.
- While the evolving situation remains unpredictable, the prevalence and severity of domestic food insecurity will depend on the length and scale of the conflict. Ukraine's food supply chain has effectively been broken amid the ongoing conflict.
- The crisis has pushed up world food prices sharply.
- The country's food supply chain is falling apart. Movements of goods have slowed down due to insecurity and the reluctance of drivers.

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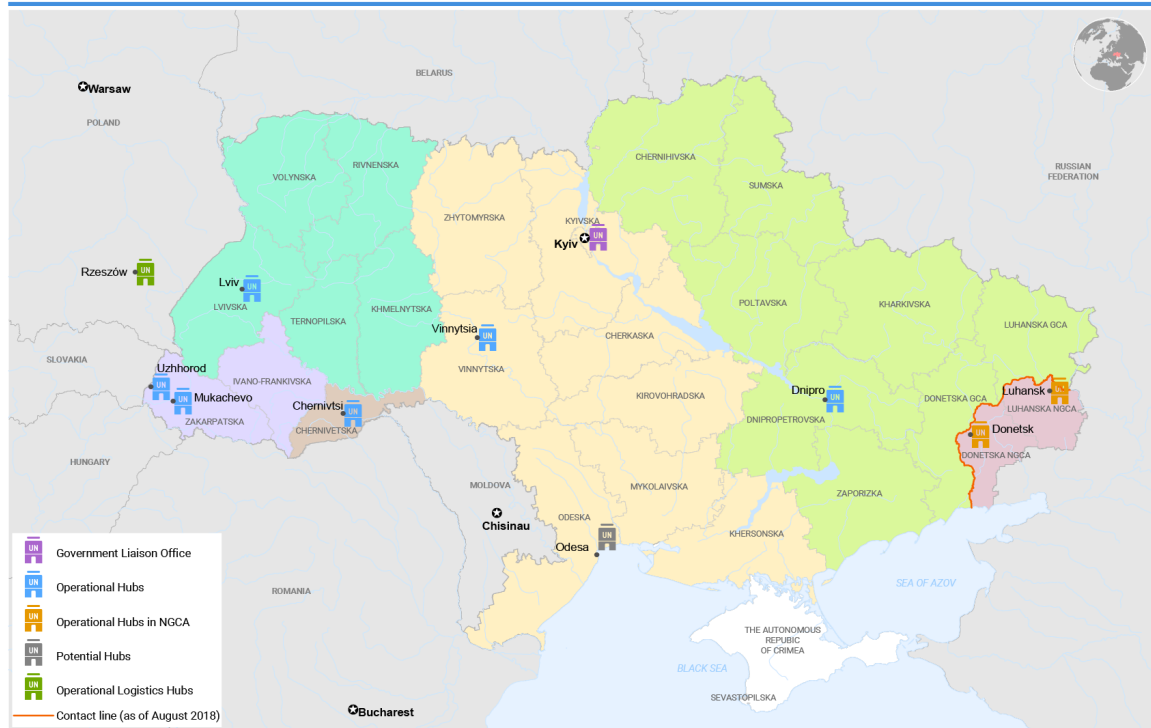

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Strengthening Humanitarian Response

As of 19 March 2022



National Cluster Coordination has moved to Lviv where Cluster Coordinators are based.

Sub-national Cluster Coordination will be in several locations of the country but beginning with **Vinnytsia and Dnipro**.

In NGCA, coordination will continue in Donetsk and Luhanska oblasts.

Additional hubs have been identified but functions and structures would need to be clarified especially areas where IDPs response.

Discussion with the SAG include:

Cluster Review Committee (CRC) – nomination



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FSL Cluster Review Committee



Objective – Review FLSC proposals (HRP and other humanitarian pull funding mechanisms) on a technical level to ensure they are consistent with FLSC's objectives, response strategies, and project selection criteria.

Composition – the CRC will consist of **9 voting members** who include **3 elected representative of Ukrainian NGOs, 3 representatives of INGOs/International Organizations and 3 UN Organizations**. The organizations that are members of the CRC cannot also be members of the Strategic Advisory Group (SAG) except the cluster lead agencies.

Eligibility to be a member of the CRC organizations should have implemented food security activities within the calendar year.

Actively participating within FSLC activities as evidenced by any of the following; attending at least in 5 meetings that have taken place within the 3 previous months, reporting food security responses implemented, undertaking food security assessments and sharing this with the cluster.

Organizations currently holding SAG position are not eligible with the exception of cluster lead agencies - **current SAG Members: ACTED, ASB, Caritas, IOM, NRC, TGH and HADC.**

Consortiums are not eligible; members of the consortium are eligible if they meet the other criteria
