Overview

How far have Russian troops advanced?

- Humanitarian needs are growing and spreading rapidly as military operations also intensify.
- Access challenges and a rapidly deteriorating security environment are hindering response efforts.
- Significant damage to crucial infrastructure continues.
- Access to vital services is becoming more and more restrictive.
- In hardest-hit areas critical supplies, including food, medicine and basic hygiene items are becoming more and more scarce.
- Markets are functioning and accessible. Yet, people's ability to purchase basic goods have been impacted by the decrease in cash reserves, empty ATMs and suspended money transfers.

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Ukraine Flash Appeal



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Strengthening Humanitarian Response



With the scale and direction of the ongoing military operation, 18 million people are projected to become affected, including up to 6.7 million people projected to be newly internally displaced. Of the affected population, 12 million people are expected to need humanitarian assistance, and 6 million with the most urgent humanitarian needs will be assisted with the resources required under this Flash Appeal, including 2.1 million IDPs covering the initial period of three months. The Flash Appeal 2022 supersedes the 2022 Humanitarian Response Plan (HRP), as of 1 March. A revision of the 2022 HRP is envisaged in the coming months.



PEOPLE TARGETED 1.5 M

Priority activities

1. Conduct rapid food security assessment.
2. Mobilize and distribute food security assistance to the people in urgent need across areas affected in the country.
3. Distribute emergency food kits, mainly for those recently displaced.
4. Distribute the regular recommended food basket for those displaced and host communities who have access to appropriate food utilization.
5. Distribute agricultural inputs to ensure farmers continue to produce, such as vegetable/ home gardening seeds, tools and support to farm animals for smallholder farmers to increase household production and nutrition.

CERF grant allocations are made for two reasons:

1. To ensure a rapid response to sudden-onset emergencies or to rapidly deteriorating conditions in an existing emergency.
2. To support humanitarian response activities within an underfunded emergency.

CERF Allocation for Ukraine – US\$18.5 M

FSLC received 0.5 million (2.7%) of the total envelop was allocated to the cluster.

UHF 2nd Reserved Allocation



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- Deadline: **Sunday March 6 at 11:45 Kyiv time**

The priority for this allocation will be given to the following areas:

- 1: Provide timely lifesaving multisectoral assistance to displaced and non-displaced persons, who are affected by the escalation of hostilities – US\$ 8 million**
- 2: Protect conflict-affected people and civilian infrastructure regarding international humanitarian law, norms, and standards – US\$ 2 million**
- 3: Support provision of basic services in areas impacted by the escalation of hostilities – US\$ 8 million**
