ADAM Floods is an extension of the ADAM system covering flood impacts to WFP operations. ADAM Floods processes satellite imagery of the event using sophisticated geoprocessing operations to create automatic analysis and map flood impacts from its partner organizations' data.


### 4 Cash Barometer survey result- Ground Truth Solution (GTS (15 min)

### Introduction

- Ground Truth Solution (GTS) is an independent accountability mechanism funded by the German Federal Foreign Office supports innovative (GFFO), covering Nigeria, Somalia, and CAR.
- Perception-based
- Mixed methods:



- Quantitative surveys
- Qualitative research
- Dialogue, training, course-correction





## Background

- Across all population groups, food is the top priority (93%) followed by livelihoods and income generating activities.
- Children and adolescents are rarely consulted or engaged in food security responses.
- Adolescents' girls and boys make up 31.3% and 27.5% of the food insecure population; acute malnutrition rate for adolescent girls in BAY states is 42%.

### **Discussion Findings:**

- *CP risks associated with food insecurity* have not been prioritized for action by humanitarian actors.
- Several actions are being taken to mainstreaming CP into FSL programming, but there is room for improvement, particularly around children's participation and empowerment.
- **Referrals** of vulnerable children into FSL programming was highlighted as a challenge. Good practices include setting aside a certain number of program participants to be referred to from CP actors.
- Limited collaboration between CP and FSL actors in developing *vulnerability or selection criteria*.
- Participants identified several existing forms of collaboration within *integrated CP-FSL programs* (e.g. positive parenting training for households receiving IGA or VSLA). However, these are few examples of comprehensive programs.
