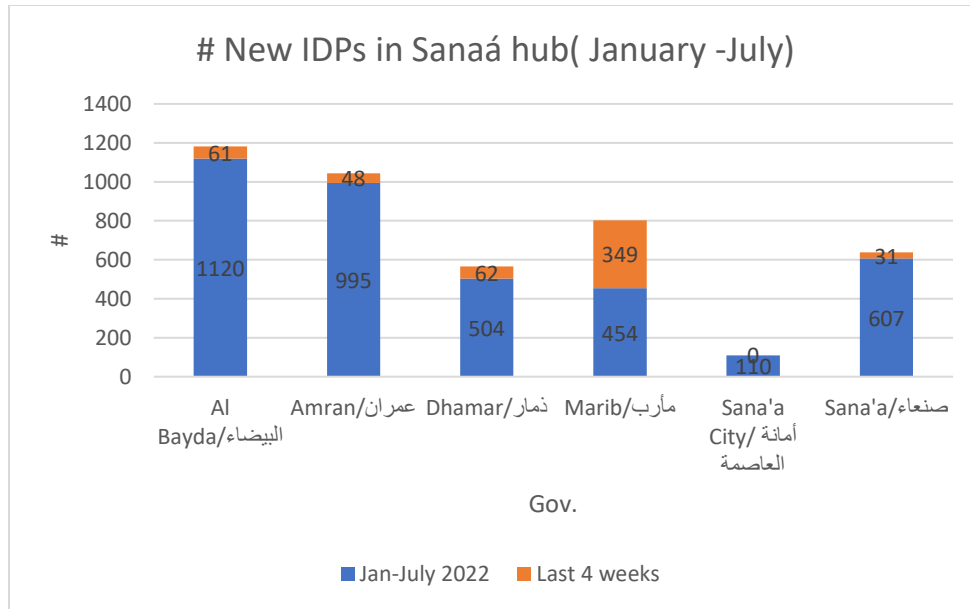

### 1. Review of previous meeting action points

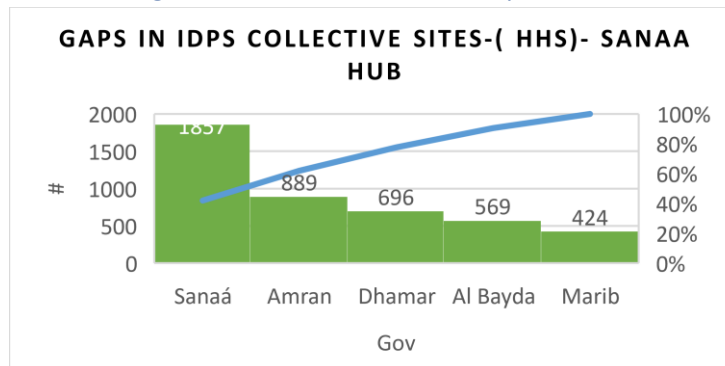
- Circulated the presentation, Links to the Access Incidents Monitoring and reporting Framework (AMRF), and OCHA access unit contact details.

### 2. IDPs responses, updates and gaps

- ❖ RRM IDPs in Sanaá ( January-July 2022) Update on Response and Gaps which are as follows:
  - As of 23rd July, 3,790 HHs are IDPs in 34 districts of 6 governorates under Sanaá hub. The source is the RRM List.
  - 646 HHs are the new IDPs displaced between 25<sup>th</sup> of June and 23<sup>th</sup> of July.
  - 3,678 HHs of the IDPs are affected by conflict while only 112 HHs are affected by Natural disasters.
  - The highest number of New IDPs are reported in Al Baydha city, Amran, Bani Husheesh and Radaá districts.
  - FSAC sub-cluster can share the lists of the New IDPs with partners has the capacity to respond for the new IDPs to proceed with field verification prior to the response and through the coordination with the sub-cluster.
  - The below graph shows the number of the New IDPs in each governorate under Sanaá hub.



- For the gaps in IDPs Collective Sites within Sanaá hub, FSAC presents the gaps which are as follows:
- In July, CCCM sub-cluster in the hub reported 4,435 HHs living in 62 IDPs Collective Sites within five governorates of Sanaá hub in a need for food assistance.
- Most of families reported in a need for food assistance have received only one off food assistance and no long terms assistance have been provided for the families.

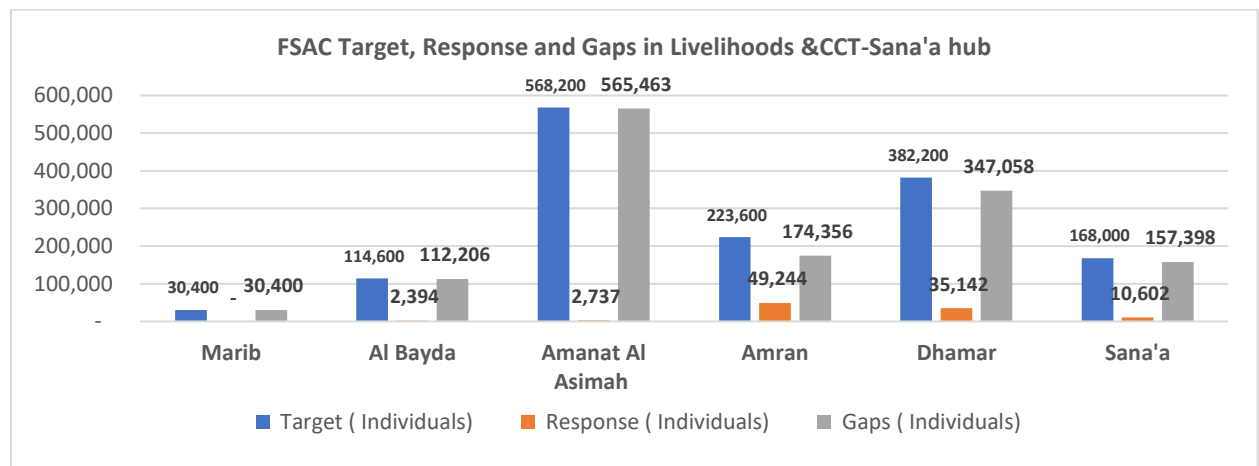
- FSAC partners to mobilize the resources for the IDPs response and coordinate for the relevant response prior to the implementation.

**3. Regular FSAC Partners' Update on Response, gaps and challenges:**

- In May 2022, 3,017,983 individuals have been assisted with monthly emergency food assistance within 6 governorate of Sanaá hub.
- FSAC targets in 2022 Target in Sanaá hub is **5,076,290** individuals. The response in May covers only 59% of the target.
- The total food gaps under Sanaá hub is **2,058,307 Individuals.**

- For Livelihoods and CCT, and as of May 2022, 100,119 individuals have been supported with livelihoods and CFW assistance; accumulative from January to May 2022.
- FSAC 2022 target for Livelihoods and CCT in Sanaá hub is 1,487,000 individuals.
- FSAC response under this objective scores only 7% of the total target for 2022 which is 1,487,000 individuals.
- The below graph indicates the current gaps in Livelihoods assistance and CCT.



- For Livelihoods and CFW ongoing interventions, ACTED reports ongoing intervention for CFW and Beekeeping interventions in Dhamar governorate that targets 2,000 HHs.

- FSAC partners report key challenges facing the implementation of food security interventions which are as follows:
  - The Exchange rate fluctuations
  - The delay of signing the sub agreements for food security projects.
  - The increased needs especially for livelihoods assistance.

- FSAC produces response products monthly to represent the achievements and responses of its partners.
  - **Partner Presence Map:** displays FSAC partners active in the different locations during any selected month.
  - **Monthly Response Dashboard:** displays FSAC partners' responses and beneficiaries assisted during any selected month.
  - **Unique Beneficiaries Dashboard:** displays the unique beneficiary figures reached by FSAC partners since January 2022.
  - **Cash and Voucher Assistance Dashboard:** displays cash and voucher assistance implemented and beneficiaries assisted by FSAC partners during the selected month.
  - **Gap Analysis Strategic objective 1 dashboard:** displays the geographic gaps where the number of the BNFs assisted is lower than HRP SO 1 target.
  - **Gap Analysis Strategic objective 2 dashboard:** displays the geographic gaps where the number of the BNFs assisted is lower than HRP SO 2 target.

## 1. Update on YHF SA1 2022

- The YHF First Standard Allocation 2022 (SA1 2022) is issued on 05 July
- A total envelope of US\$44 M will be available to YHF partners
- Priority 1 (\$14.5 million): Aims to prevent famine and mitigate hunger by increasing access to food and other lifesaving supplies and services through the Integrated Famine Rapid Response (IFRR) package. YHF partners will provide multi-sectoral response in 14 districts with pockets of IPC 5 populations as identified in the table below. The clusters identified are FSAC, HEA, NUT, and WASH.
- Priority 2 (\$29.5 million): Provision of emergency, life-saving assistance, and protection (CCCM, PRO, WASH, EDU, ETC, RRM, RMMS).
- Prioritized districts under FSAC are as follows:

Governorate	Districts
Amran	Harf Sufyan, Habur Zulaymah, Al Ashah, As Sudah, As Sawad
Marib	Majzer, Medghal, Al Abdiyaha

❖ **Brief discussion on Floods Preparedness plan**

- Rainfall season started in Sanaá in the second week of July in which alerts are received from OCHA, CCCM and FSAC partners in several governorates within Sanaá hub.
- Partners are requested to be alerted and prepared for the emergency response, conducting verification, assessment in reported affected districts.
- Partners need to coordinate with FSAC for undertaking assessment and response in terms of food assistance.
- YRCS, ICRC, IFRC, and SCI started the preparedness activities allocating some resources for the potential floods response in Sanaá hub.

**Action points**

- FSAC partners to mobilize the resources for the floods response and effectively coordinate with the relevant/key stakeholders for any potential assessment and support.
